ERTN-Plans for a new subdivision to be built on the east side of Erin Gardens were revealed at this month's Erin township council meeting. The subdivision, to be built by Flamingo Homes, will border and cover an area cast of Erin village. The streets of this new development would connect with the existing streets in Erin Gardens. The plans call for 66 houses to be built on 9,500 to 10,000 square foot lots, with approximately 75 foot of frontage. Council filed the plans which were shown as a gesture of courtesy. The Community Planning Branch of the Ontario government will have to approve the plans before construction can

ACTON-Six employees from a town works force of 11 handed in resignations last week carrying out a move they threatened several weeks ago. The men have a total of 64 years with the luwn, Sam Tennant, 22 years; John Van den Brink, 18 years; Don Swackhamer and John Dunn, with 10 years each; Larry Frizzell with four years, and Ernie Medland, a new employee walked off the job over a dispute with council about the appointment of a foreman. The men said they had taken jobs elsewhere.

MILTON-Milton may have to send its garbage to Oakville. Milton council, two weeks ago, acknowledged complaints about continued activity at its present landfill site, but noted repeated attempts to locate a dump site in an adjacent municipality had been rejected forcing the town to continue at the Parkway Avenue site. Works superintendent Bruce McKerr told coun-cillors he had to start filling back further at the site to prolong the life of the existing site. "I don't know what else to do with the flow of garbage," he acknowledged. "What we pick up around the town is a very small percentage of the total garbage."

ORANGEVILLE-A proposal has been made to erect a medeat centre on the site of the old arena. A special committee from the Dufferin Area Hospital Board made this recommendation at last week's town council meeting. Committee chairman William Hux of the hospital board said a medical centre on this site, at the corner of Faulkner and Elizabeth streets, would entice specialists to locate in Orangeville and could be used in conjunction with Dufferin Area Hospital.

GUELPH-McDonald's Restaurants received the go-ahead a week ago Tuesday from the Ontario Municipal Board to establish | club brought its record up to tories in three starts this past in Guelph at a site on Woolwich Street. Green Forests Development Ltd. assembled a site 160 feet wide by 280 feet deep on Woolwich Street for the McDonald location. It is on the east side, between Speedvale and Woodlawn. Officials said they were convinced of the "good corporate image" of the restaurant chain.

What Bell Canada needs to put in these lines is buried type cable which is produced at these locations of Northern Electric The Bramalea plant of Northern, which is back to normal, now produces only switching equipment.




