NE Clerical Staff Back On The Job

The Northern Electric plant in Bramalea is back in operation this week following a weekend vote by members of the United Auto Workers union to accept a new three-year contract with the firm.

About 3,500 workers had been on strike at four Northern Electric plants in Ontario for more than two months.

V. A. Graham president of one of Northern Electric's two Bramalea switching divisions said most of the 600 workers involved in the Bramalea strike were clerical staff paid weekly, not hourly. He said they will receive a 7 1/2 percent increase in the first year of the contract; an additional 4 1/2 percent starting in Feb., 1974 and another four percent from Feb. 1975.

Workers will also receive fringe benefits, including a paid week-long vacation during Christmas, when the plant is closed; improved vacation, welfare and medical benefits, and a fully-paid dental plan, to start in the third year of the contract.

Earlier this month the United Electrical Workers, Local 531, signed a contract after an eight-week strike. The plant was back in "patchwork operation" following the signing of that contract.

Region Elections Enumerating Done

Enumerations for the Oct. 1 regional elections in Peel and Halton Counties have been completed and preliminary voters' lists will be turned over to area returning officers by Aug. 10.

Robert Beach, regional assessment commissioner, said the enumeration was completed in 10 days during the period from June 18 to June 28. Regional enumerators listed voters in both Peel and Halton counties, a total of 17 municipalities in preparation for the Oct. 1 election.

Mr. Beach said the preliminary lists will be in the hands of the area returning officers by the Aug. 10 date to allow sufficient time for posting of the lists, changes in names or addresses, addition of names and for the printing of voters' lists.

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Allan McCormick Dies in Toronto

A Georgetown resident since 1968, Allan John Albert McCormick, died in Toronto Western Hospital, June 22. He was in his 51st year.

A funeral service was held June 25 in St. John's United Church, conducted jointly by Rev. Harold Martin, of St. John's United Church, and Rev. Kelvin Johnston, St. Andrew's United Church.

Mr. McCormick came to Georgetown July 26, 1968, as plant manager of Dennison Manufacturing Co. of Canada Ltd., Georgetown. He was later the local representative of the Northern Life Assurance Co. of Canada, specializing in estate planning. At the time of his death he was an independent agent handling all classes of general insurance as well as life insurance.

During the years 1954-1968, he was industrial engineering manager, industrial relations manager, and office services manager with Dennison at Drummondville, Quebec. From 1945 to 1954 he worked with the control and development staff, textile department, at Canadian Celanese (n. Ltd., Drummondville, Quebec.

Prior to his war service years, he was a clerk with the Dominion Rubber Co., Montreal, Quebec, and worked in circulation sales for the Montreal Gazette in Ottawa.

Mr. McCormick was a flight sergeant, air gunner, with the RCAF, base in England, from 1942 to 1945.
