## SWEEP Crews Assist Excavate Indian Village

Six SWEEP workers are unhappy about leaving the 600 year old Huron Indian site near Crawford Lake, which they have been excavating for the past three weeks. Crawford Lake is in Western Halton.

The SWEEP workers have been re-assigned to stream cleanup in Milton and Burlington. They became involved with the archeological work after Dr. John McAndrews of the Royal Ontario Museum discovered maize pollen, from a type of Indian corn, at the bottom of Crawford Lake. This discovery led Bill Finlayson, a professor at the University of Western Ontario, to assume that an Indian settlement was in close proximity.

After learning where a nearby farmer had found several artifacts, Finlayson narrowed the site down to a small area on the Halton Region Conservation Authority's land, about half a mile from the lake.

They have found evidence of six long houses, the biggest one about 30 feet wide and 150 feet long. These long houses were made by bending wooden poles in an arbor shape and covering them with bark.

Mr. Finlayson estimates between 250 and 300 Indians once lived in this settlement.

## Halton Will Send Two Reps To Munich Conference

Halton county council will send two representatives to a world highways conference in Munich, Germany, Oct. 14 to 19.

The two will be chosen by county council's road committee.

Reeve Ric Morrow said at a meeting last week it would be criminal to send someone who wasn't going to be a member of the new Halton regional council, which won't be elected until Oct. 4.

Warden Anne MacArthur replied, "I think the roads committee, in its own wisdom would send two people who will be serving on regional council."

Reeve Tom Hill of Esquesing, chairman of the roads committee, said the trip would be expensive because the county would have to pay full fares for those going.

"When we were informed of a charter flight in April, no one wanted to go, so we let the idea drop. The flight now is filled," added Reeve Hill.
