

L. Lutgendorff Retires Teaching Since 1929

On the last day of school, the student body and staff of the Georgetown District Christian School said farewell to a teacher and colleague L. Lutgendorff. Mr. Lutgendorff began teaching in the Netherlands in 1929. In 1954 he began his teaching career in Canada. He served as principal at the Christian schools of Asylmer, Trenton and Willowdale.

Mr. Lutgendorff's teaching career came to an abrupt end when in 1965 he was seriously injured in a car accident. In 1969 he was capable of taking a full-time teaching position with the Georgetown District Christian School.

As a farewell gift Mr. Lutgendorff received a traveller's alarm clock, a pen and pencil set and writing paper. He and his wife plan to do much travelling.
