**Assistant Superintendents Will Remain At Nine**

Burlington trustee Tony Goodyear, following a study into the role of the assistant superintendents, recommended to the Halton Board of Education, Thursday, that the number be reduced from nine to six and that this be initially by attrition commencing in the school year 1974-75 or by relocation of persons to other responsible positions.  
Mr. Goodyear told the board that assistant superintendents are "missing the boat in qualifications as to what their duties are." He stated that this personnel spend one third of the week doing clerical work, one third attending meetings, and one third in visitations.  
He expressed his opinion that their time could be better spent. He asked whether the time "pushing paper" typing aims and objectives was necessary. James Singleton, director of education, said that this time was not spent doing clerical work but answering parent complaints and working on principal reports. He also added that they hadn't tried using nine and this would have to be done first in order to decide what the right figure is. The number of assistant superintendents was reduced from 12 to nine this year. The cost being reduced from \$5.46 to \$4.66 per pupil. The allocation of these officials is two in the north, three in the east, and four in the west. Trustee Goodyear proposed one in the north, two in the east and three in the west.  
Georgetown trustee Ernie Bodnar stated that the cost factor in this organization would compare with any school board. After remarking in a joking fashion that the board thought things were "sort of far flung in north" and that "we have to get around in a dog sled," he added that all systems have to be under constant review. He said however that the board should stick with nine until it was tried.  
The recommendation for six assistant superintendents instead of nine was defeated.
