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Warden's Farm In Path of Preferred Hydro Route

A conflict of interest was declared by county warden Anne MacArthur and she did not vote on the hydro-corridor route that Halton Region Conservation Authority will recommend to the Solandt Commission. By a single vote the authority approved a route that would obliterate Mrs. MacArthur's farm on the 5 Sideroad in Massagaweya.

The route would follow Highway 401 through Halton from Highway 6 to Peel County. The corridor is 610 feet wide. The authority will recommend that a northerly section of the route go through Beverly Swamp in East Flamborough — or skirt the edges of the swamp — so farms in that area will not be cut up.

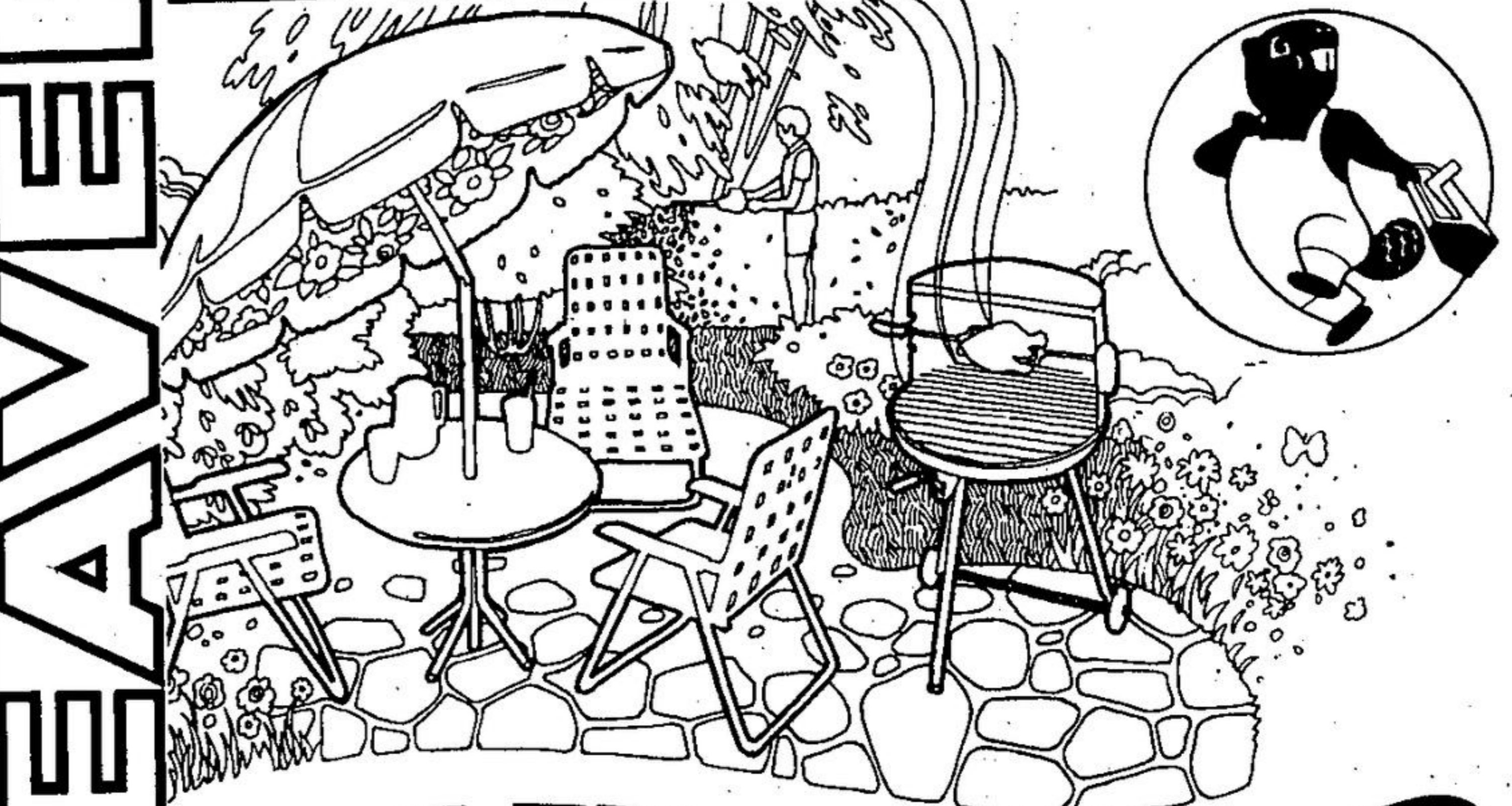
Mrs. MacArthur urged, at the conservation meeting last week, that the hydro route swing north of properties on the 5 Sideroad, including her own, until it reached Highway 25, which it would follow south to Milton.

She said properties along the sideroad from the Guelph Line to Highway 25 are already hemmed in by the sideroad and Highway 401, and would be obliterated by the corridor. She said five farms, nine houses and 420 acres of farmland would be wiped out.

An authority study said that power routes north of the sideroad would be no better. Both routes would extend along the face of the Niagara escarpment for a short distance before they turned eastward. The most southerly would eliminate 16 homes, four farms, and 364 acres of farmland. The other would affect three farms, seven houses and 392 acres of farm land.

CONFORMITY
