White Grubs Kill Lawns

Sizes 2 to 6X

That June bug beating itself against your screen door in the evening may mean that your lawn is intested with white grubs. White grubs are the June bug larvae and they are highly destructive to lawns, says John Hughes, horticultural specialist, Ontario Ministry of

Agriculture and Food. White grubs can be controlled with chlordane insecticide. If sections of your lawn look brown and the turf is loose, apply chlordane, available as a dust or spray, over your entire lawn, taking care to follow the manufacturer's instructions. Do not be discouraged if the problem is not cleared up immediately. White grubs are extremely hardy and will not be immediately eliminated by the nsecticide.

Be sure to water the lawn thoroughly after the chlordane has been applied.
