Georgetown is the scene of much lofty activity this month as Georgetown hydro crews finish relocating hydro lines and increasing the circuit capacity in Georgetown.

rebuilding is taking place on Park Avenue from Main Street to Market Street. A section is being built along the east end of John Street to the Riverview apartments.

On Guelph street, the lines are being moved back five feet from the highway in the area between Maple Avenue and Water Street. Replacements are being made on Main Street from Maple Avenue to Church Street.

Hugh Campbell, assistant manager at Georgetown hydro estimates the capital costs of the Maple-Main area at \$15,000 and the Guelph Street area at \$10,000. There are eight hydro employees working on the job and three trucks being used.

An additional circuit is being added on Tyres Avenue and

**May Refuse Licence
To Dufferin Quarries**

Halton Region Conservation Authority will refuse a licence extension to Dufferin Quarries unless it agrees to abide by terms of a 1961 agreement that, according to the HRCA, has been violated for the past 12 years.

Dufferin quarries asked for clearance to excavate 318 acres of rock in two phases. The authority stated even if conditions were met they would only approve the first phase, the digging operations on 100 acres. The second phase would be delayed to allow for completion of an over-all study of the escarpment area.

An agreement between the predecessors of Dufferin Quarries-the St. Lawrence Cement Company; and what was then known as the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority prohibits any water runoff from excavated pits.

It was reported to the Halton Region Conservation Authority meeting that runoff has been allowed and that the result is the ruination of the Esqueping Pond located just north of Sideroad 3 in Nassagaweya.

Murray Stephen, authority general manager explained that the banks of the three acre pond have been built up three times to accommodate the extra runoff from the quarry. He added that heavy deposits of silt in the pond had killed off trout. The water there is brown with the mud, he added.

Conditional to any authority approval for the quarry expansion Dufferin will have to agree to rehabilitate the pond and remove the silt deposits.
