## Falcons Soar At Willowdale

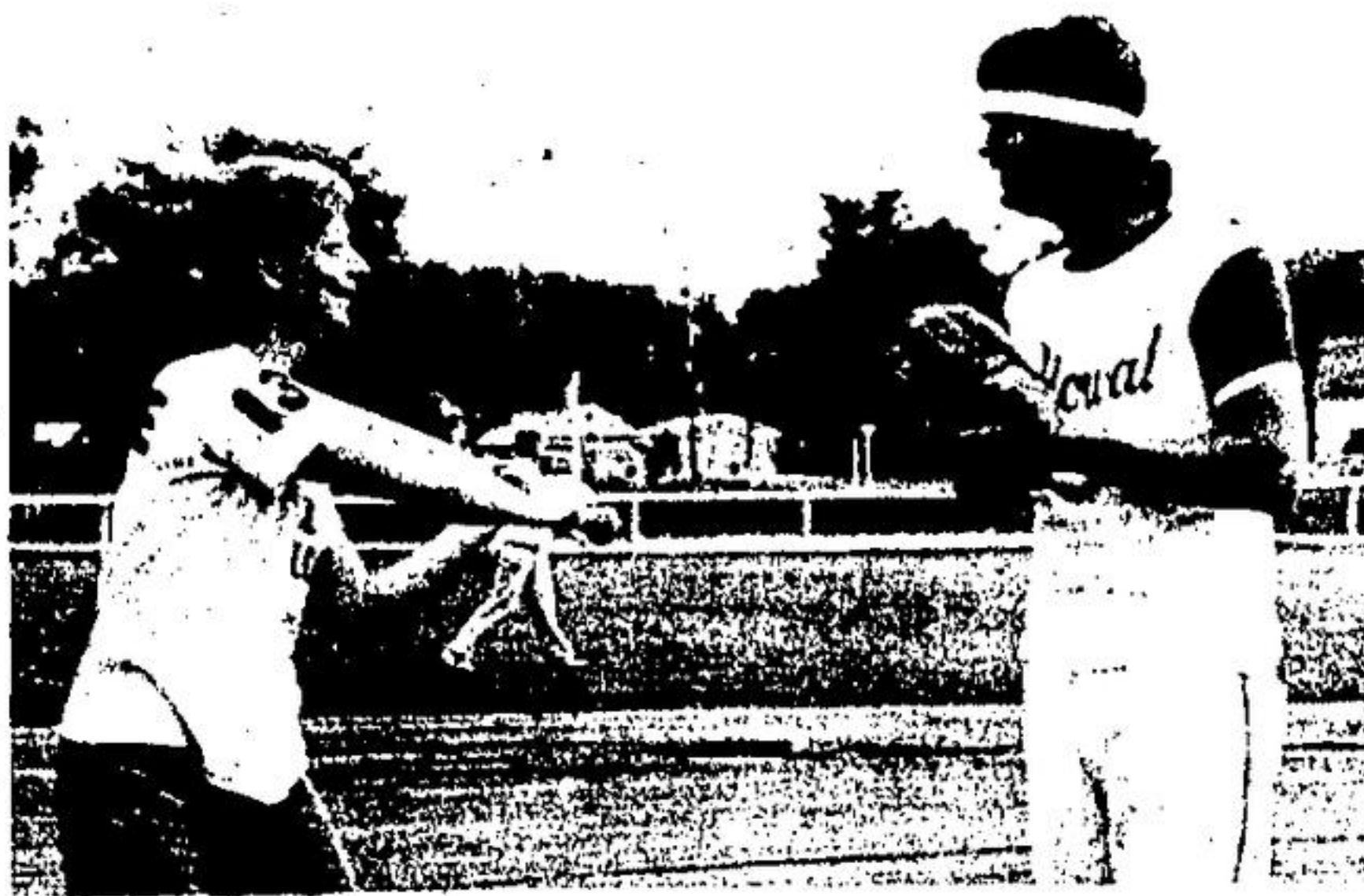
Georgetown Falcons, playing their best game of the season, defeated a much higher placed Willowdale Park 4-0 in a senior soccer game in Toronto, Friday.

The victory moved Falcons up two places in the league standings.

## Zakia Cashes in Again Tightens Grip on First

With an apparent strangle hold on top spot in the Modified Eliminator points race Jim Zakia showed no mercy as he once again dominated over all competition at Toronto International Dragway, Saturday, to take home the gold, while Bill Morrison and his Karbell Camaro cashed in for the third time this year in the Super Stock class.

Any hope that John Rossiter had of narrowing the gap between himself and Zakia went out the window in round one when the E-G Camaro encountered transmission problems on the line, letting Norm Noddle's C-A Dodge solo on an 11.07-129. Don Neelands newly classed C-G Camaro had an equally easy time when Brian Little's Cuda shut down on the line forcing an automatic disqualification. Zakia coasted through round one when his scheduled competition didn't

make the call while in other eliminator action Jerry Lafontaine's E-MP Plymouth fouled against the Everett-Forrest D-A Camaro with a red light. The D-A Maverick of Scotchorne and Howe committed a similar infraction giving an easy win to the Yarlett-Warren C-G Nova. In the only true match of round one Bob Davidson's D-MP Comet laid down a 15.22-105 split in defeating the Chuck Sparks-Peter Bond H-MP six cylinder Chevy 11 which trailed with a break-in 17.39-77 mph.

**HEADS UP MATCH**

Bob Davidson's D-MP failed to show for his second round pairing against Jim Zakia, giving the Opel a coast through win at 10.38-102. In a heads up match Neelands C-G Camaro came out on top over the Yarlett-Warren C-G Nova 10.79-129 to 11.10-127 while Everett's D-A Camaro advanced to the

semi finals when Norm Noddle rolled out of stage, lighting up the big red eye. Noddle and Warren were brought back for fourth place money, with the nod going to the chopped-off Dodge on a respectable 10.89-129.

Zakia's power was not tested in the semi-finals as he drew the bye while Neeland and the Everett-Forrest Camaro squared off with the latter coming up with a red light and third place money, as Neeland eased to the final.

In an evening filled with fouls and breakage, the final proved no different as Neelands Camaro tripped the red light and Zakia served notice that he could run, recording another near record 9.26-150 mph.

Despite the small field first round of Super Stock had close racing with only one foul going to a disappointed Norm Dutton, which gave the automatic win to Phil Strudwick's SS-W "Power Centre" Chevy. Dave Freeman's SS-HA Mustang nipped John Pipher's SS-PA Malibu with a top end charge of 12.14-114 to Pipher's 13.37 and in another Ford vs. GM clash Bruce Fitzgibbon's Mustang was triumphant over Dennis Machin's SS-I Camaro, 11.42-118 to a close 12.20-112. Bill Morrison's Karbell Camaro closed the round with an 11.98-119 mph bye.

Morrison advanced to the final at the expense of the "Power Centre" Chevy when he eased by with a 12.37-114 to the big Chevy's 13.76. Fitzgibbon's berth in the final was made easy when Freeman fouled on a red light.

When Freeman and Strudwick returned to decide third and fourth place finishers it was Ford all the way as the strong SS-HA Mustang blew by the SS-W Chevrolet with a 12.04-

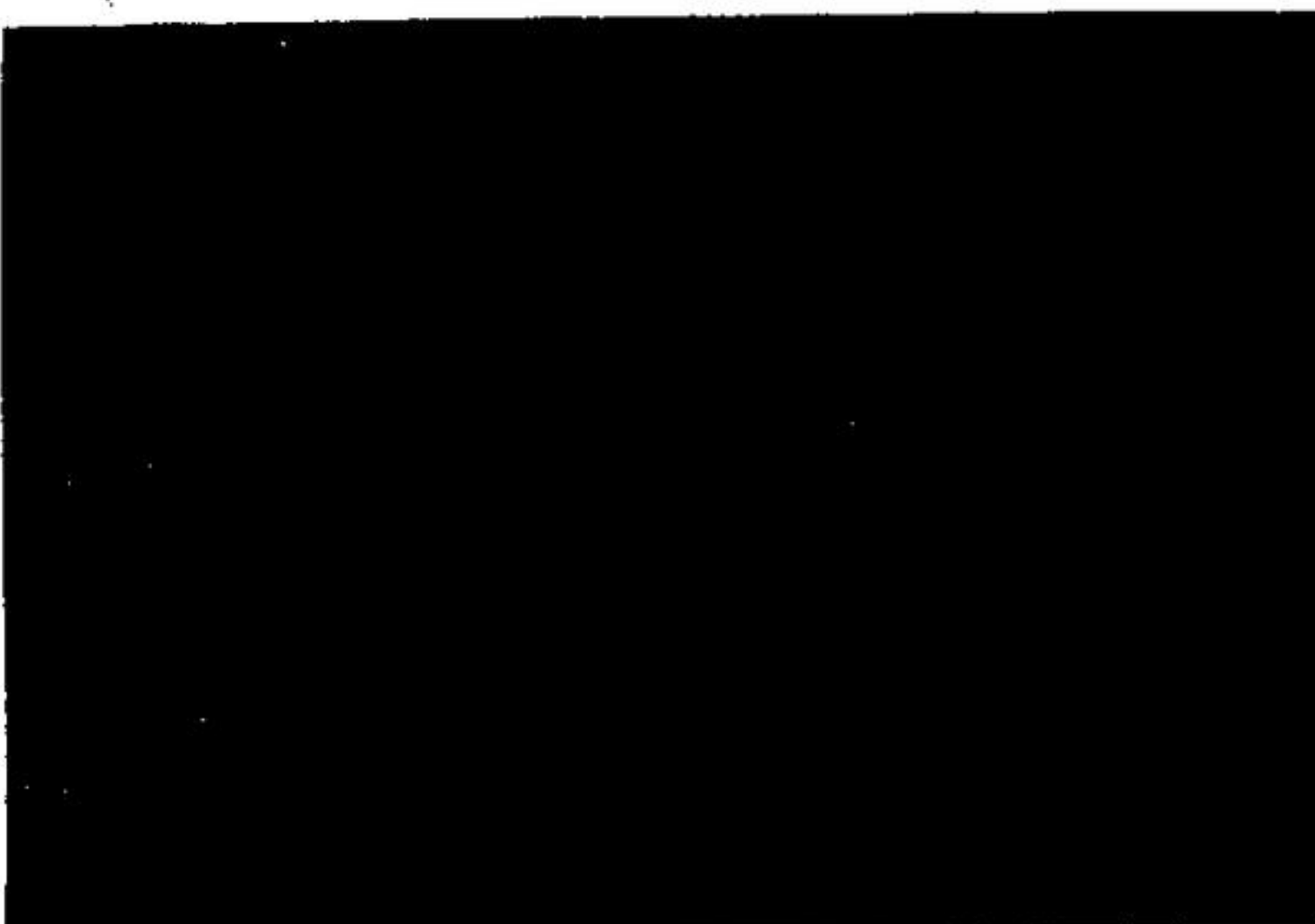
