Now Is Time To Start Lawn

Seeding a new lawn or renovating an old one? Late August or early September is considered the best time of year for this gardening job, points out D.B. McNeill, a horticultural specialist with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food. This allows the grass to establish itself quickly before the winter months, since the heat of summer is past, but weather is still warm.

Establish a good growth, four to six inches of topsoil is sufficient, but the more the better. Fertility is very important at seeding time. Prior to levelling, packing and seeding, apply a fertilizer which is high in phosphate. The phosphate will help seeds to germinate quickly, thus establishing the lawn much faster.

After seeding, keep the site moist and use a mulch such as straw, peat moss or burlap to retain moisture. Do not cut it before next spring. By leaving it 4 to 5 inches high, it will have a much better chance of surviving the winter.

A good lawn is a prime feature of any home, and the requirement is good soil. Grass will grow on poor soil, but it will be more difficult to establish. In poor soil, grass stands are thinner and more susceptible to invasion by weeds. Adding a layer of fertile topsoil will help

base for all other garden landscaping. The little extra time and money spent at seeding time will make it that much better.

Library Crowded For Taste Of Jazz

There has been jazz at the philharmonic, and jazz at Carnegie Hall, but to the jazz buffs who crowded Georgetown public library to the doors, jazz at the library topped them all, Thursday night.

There were no teeny boppers, very few teens, but a lot of 30s, 40s and 50s, who listened with faces wreathed in smiles, shoulders and heads moving, and feet tapping, as the Steel City Six, recalled the big names of the big bands: names such as Roy Eldridge, Jack Teagarden, Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong, Count Basie, Benny Goodman, Thelonius Monk, Charlie Parker, and Dave Brubeck, were recalled as the group from Hamilton played all kinds of jazz.

It started with New Orleans jazz from about the turn of the century, and proceeded through Dixieland, swing, hop, progressive jazz and rock. Lloyd Peach, who played clarinet and alto sax, made a brief commentary as the six man group progressed through the years. Al Ludlow on

trombone, Al Jackson on trumpet, Vic Hill at piano, Ken Westwood on bass and Chuck Woods on drums, made up the group that had the audience asking librarian Marjorie Nazer, if they could enjoy a repeat performance.

This concert was one of a series being held in libraries

throughout the South Central Regional Library System.

The Steel City Six has presented concerts in schools, hoping to introduce the young people to jazz and a brass section, instead of simply guitars. Halton County Board of Education is considering them for concerts in this area.
