### First Sale Of Wheat

Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board has made the first sale of the 1973 crop winter wheat for export at the highest price received since the board began operations in 1958.

K. A. Standing, secretarymanager of the marketing board said slightly more than 370,000 bushels were sold at a price over \$4.00 per bushel pasis Montreal.

The sale was made to a traditional customer for immediate shipment according to the board official.

Mr. Standing also advised that the marketing board has taken possession of a volume in excess of five million bushels of the 1973 crop to date under the new agency marketing system.

He said the board has moved about two million bushels into export position and the balance is moving into domestic consumption positions.
