Rural Philosophy

Declare War On Lawn Ants

Ants are one of the most interesting and industrious insects. Nonetheless, when they infest your lawn, they create unsightly and troublesome mounds that can be rough on your lawnmower. There are several ways to control ants. says D.B. McNelll, horticultural specialist with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Chlordane is effective for controlling ants in lawns. The chemical, available emulsion, wettable powder, and granular forms, should be used-according to the manufacturer's directions for ant control.

Spot treatment can be ef-fective in eliminating ant hills for a short time. Apply an 1/4 teaspoon of 40 per cent chlordane wettable powder to each hill and wash it in. One teaspoon of granular chlordane will give similar control.
