Emphasis On Individual Attention At Summer Playground For Retarded

A summer day camp where the ratio of children to counsellors, was two to one, closed Friday after a six week program.

The day camp for retarded children was held at Pineview school where the emphasis was on individual attention.

The 17 children, ranging in age from three to 18 were instructed in crafts, physical education, creative dancing, cooking, and having fun, by eight young counsellors under the leadership of Mrs. Dorothy Woods, of Georgetown.

The retarded children were included in trips to Ontario Science Centre, Riverdale Zoo, Centre Island and Ontario Place, with the children attending the playgrounds run by the Georgetown recreation department.

The trips were a deliberate plan to integrate the retarded children with normal children. "It worked well," said Mrs. Dorothy Woods.

On closing day, the children decorated the trees with streamers, and baked and decorated a birthday cake for one of their friends.

"The children did it themselves, under our supervision," said Mrs. Woods. The young staffers, Karen Friskney, Darlene Beerman, Karen Taylor, Ric Hammond, Judy Seaton, Jane McNally, Fran Harber and Mrs. Dorothy Woods, display infinite patience and affection for the children.

The idea for the day camp was brought to Georgetown and Milton recreation departments by Les Griffiths of The North Halton Association for the

Mentally Retarded. An opportunity for Youth grant was received from the government and the program launched.

It has been so successful that the recreation departments of both towns may work it into their regular recreation program.

Coil Smokes But No Fire

Where there's smoke there isn't always fire. Georgetown Fire Department answered one call to a burning mosquito coil.

Fire Chief Ken Buikema called it a "needless call to investigate smoke."

The coils are used to keep flies away from outdoor gatherings.

During July, the department answered 14 calls, evenly divided between Georgetown and Esquesing. That was two calls more than in the same month last year. To date, there have been 93 calls answered (58 to Georgetown), compared with 83 in 1972.

Fire damage in July was placed at \$1,050, up considerably from the \$600 of July last year, but loss during this year of \$70,800, is down sharply from \$81,240 in the previous year.

During July, department response was to, buildings, three; accidents, three; open fires, three, and other, five. Causes were: negligence, four; accidental, one; maintenance, one, and other, eight.

Three calls resulted from traffic mishaps and one call was to a water mishap at Waterfalls Park, Limehouse.
