Georgetown Royalties' climb to the Provincial Women's Softball Union midget A title has been halted on the top rung by a team from Bridlewood, near Agincourt.

A crowd of 300 watched the Royalties take their second defeat in the best-of-three series under the lights at the Georgetown park, Friday night.

Bridlewood got standout fielding and hitting from their pitcher who led them to a 13-7 victory, Friday.

"This was the fastest and best fielding pitcher the Royalties have ever faced," manager Jack Handy later told The Herald.

"The girls played terrific ball in the Ontario playoffs and are a real credit to the town and their sponsors, Legion Branch 120," he said.

This was Royalties' first attempt at winning the Ontario crown.

They dropped the first game in Bridlewood, Aug. 21, 9-4 after holding the lead for seven and a half innings. The game was called before the end of eight innings due to a curfew on the park lights.

## Zakia, Fitzgibbon Tops In Golden Wheels Points

The Molson Golden Wheels points race concluded Saturday at Toronto International Dragway and despite individual wins by Gordon Strutt in modified eliminator and Bill Morrison in super stock, the number one spot in these respective classes was captured by an absent Jim Zakia, who had already accumulated enough points to lock up top honors and Bruce Fitzgibbon who advanced to the final before being edged by Morrison.

With their first place finish, Zakia and Fitzgibbon earned an automatic bye to the final when the Golden Wheels Awards climax at the third annual All-Pro National, Sept. 8 and 9 weekend.

Strutt began his march to the top money on an easy note when Max Parker's E-MP Valiant tripped the red light, while Bob Elliott at the wheel of the Ball Auction's C-G Camaro had an equally easy effort when his competition didn't make the call letting the Guelph-based car through on a solo run.

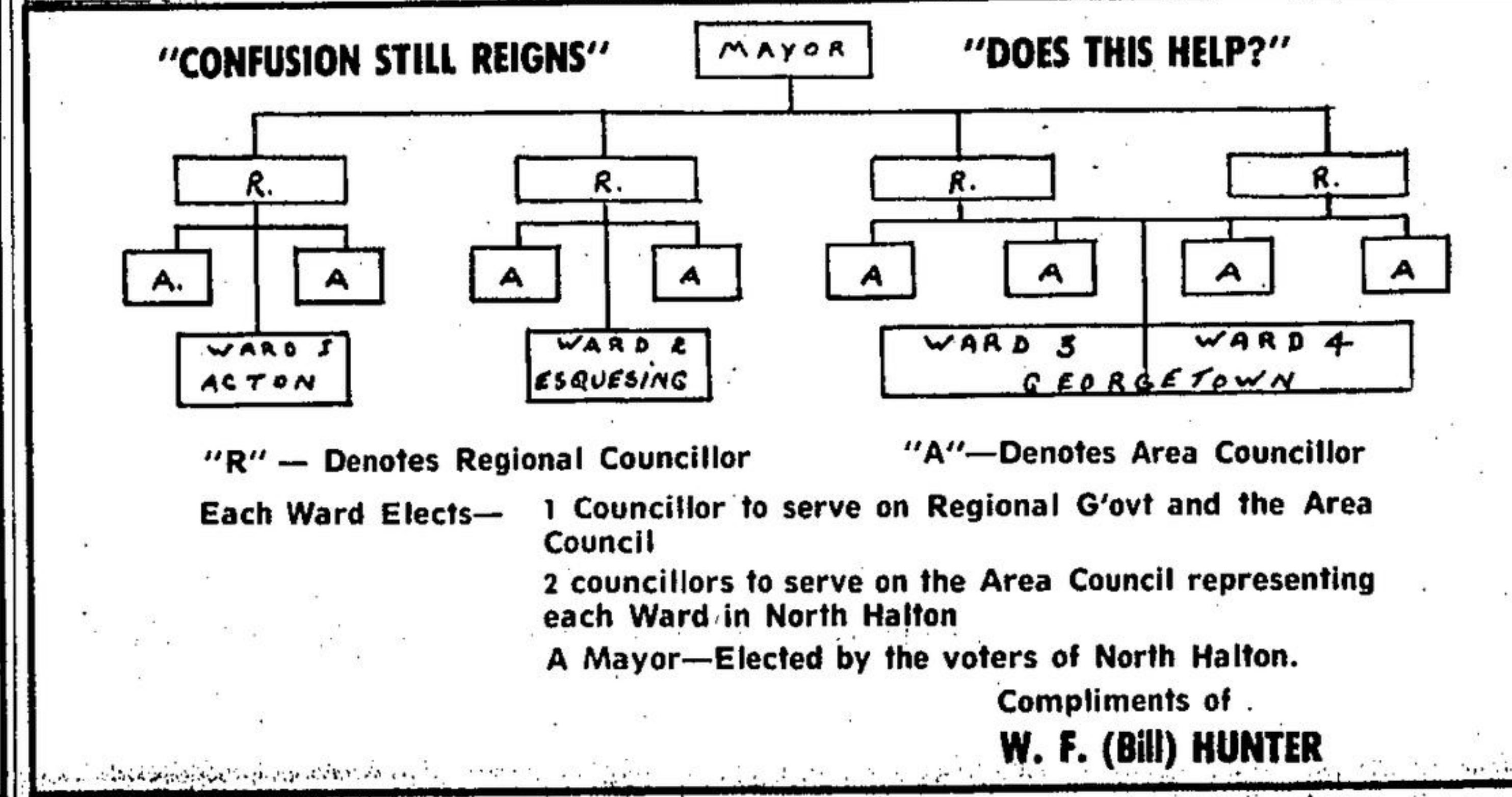
The Larry Minaker-Scott Patterson D-G Comet advanced to the second round when it laid down a 12.50 elapsed time in defeating Ed Trusser's 1935 B-A Fargo Truck which trailed on a break in 13.10 at 99.3 m.p.h. Jerry Lafontaine's E-MP Plymouth tripped the lights with a lone 12.73-106 when Brian Little's C-A Cuda broke on the line.

In the balance of first round, the Haw & Scothorne D-A Maverick dumped Paul Campbell's E-MP Comet with an 11.05 and Norm Noddle eased his C-A Dodge through on a 12.20 bye run.

Strutt had no problem roasting Elliott's Camaro in round two as his E-G "Polar Express" combined an 11.66-117 to a troubled 15.11-56 on the Ball car. The Haw & Scothorne car cut the tree too fine and saw red for the effort, leaving Norm Noddle to limp through for the win, in spite of broken throttle linkage on the chopped-off Dodge. The Lafontaine Plymouth met no resistance in qualifying for the semi-finals as the Manaker-Patterson D-G Comet failed to make the call.

Lafontaine once gain looked a gift horse in the eye as he drew the bye while Strutt and Noddle squared off to decide who would meet the Plymouth in the final. At the traps it was the Polar Express on top with 11.54-118.4 over Noddle's quicker but trailing 11.09-126.5 m.p.h. pass.

Fourth place money was decided at the tree when the Haw & Scothorne Maverick picked a red light giving the purse to the Ball Auction Camaro. The final was an equally fruitless task as
