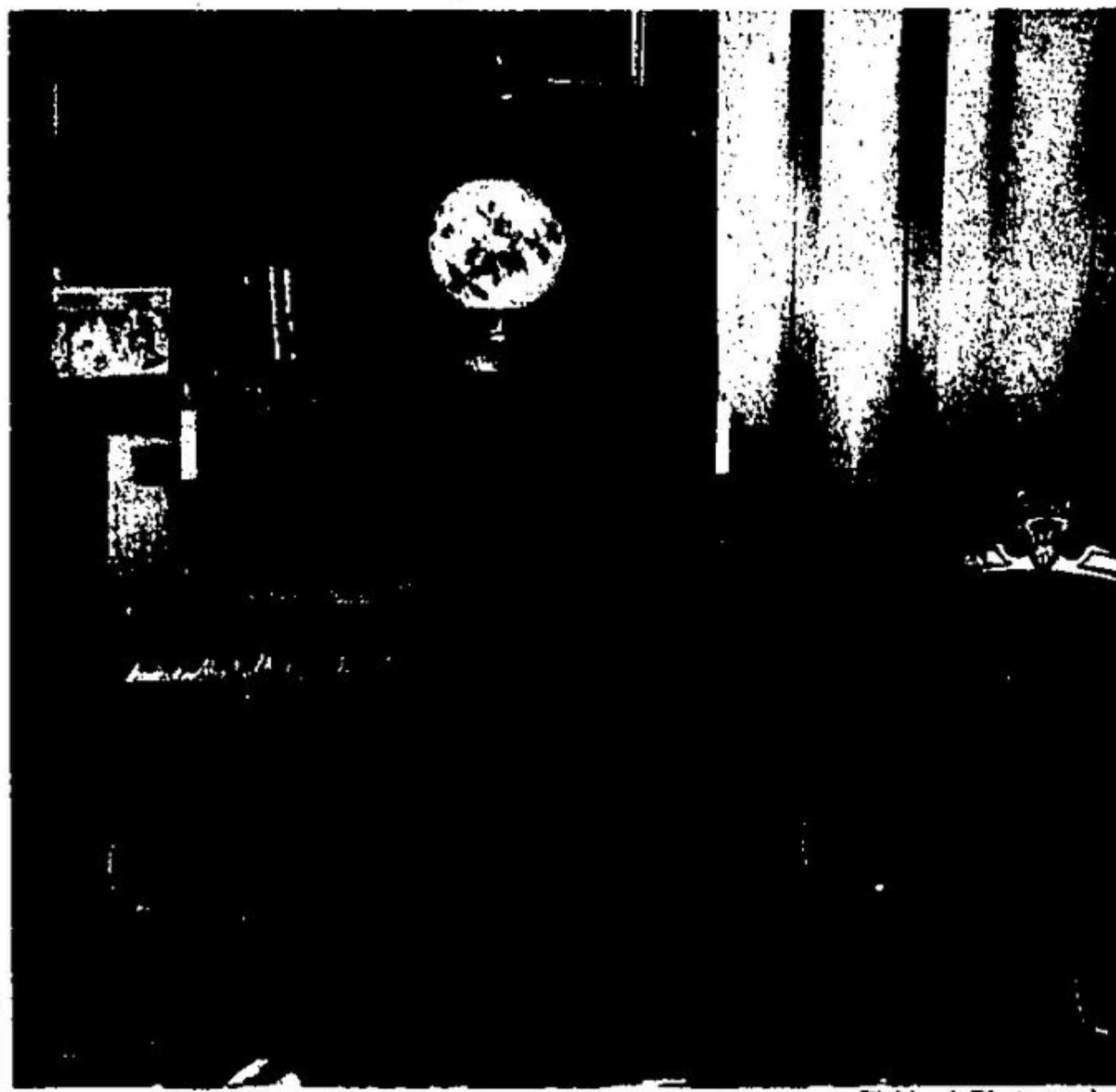

MUSEUM NOTES

Four Buildings Open At Summer Festival

Once again it's festival time at The Halton County Museum, Kelso Park. The Friends of the Museum will sponsor their fourth annual summer festival this weekend. Four museum buildings will be open for inspection, the barn, circa 1850, displaying pioneer and Victorian household furnishings; the craft house, housing period costumes and handcrafts; the carriage house, filled with horsedrawn vehicles, and antique toys, school, and ornithological collections; and the log cabin, circa 1822, an excellent example of the county's earliest homes.

The proceeds from the 1970 and 1971 festivals were used to defray expenses in reconstructing an old log cabin beside the museum pond. The cabin was saved from demolition in Nassagaweya, and was brought to the museum grounds log-by-log for reassembly. Last year, the Friends raised money for the construction of a massive terrace in front of the barn—the main museum building. To the auxiliary, 1973 is known as The Year of the Fountain. This year's funds will contribute to the construction of a fountain in the middle of the new terrace. Both fountain and terrace were designed by former museum director, Dr. H.J. Newman, who has donated his

time to the Friends to superintend the projects. The festival's music program takes place outdoors, in the museum's garden. Among those entertaining will be Georgetown's Legion pipe band, and girls pipe band; and Oakville's barbershoppers, and citizens band. There will be demonstrations of spinning, weaving, pottery making, furniture stripping, and chair caning. Interesting purchases can be made from booths featuring Canadian handcrafts, antiques, items from ARC Industries, and a white elephant table. Raffle tickets will be sold for a quilt, hand-sewn by Mrs. H. Bradley of Hornby. Quilting, an ancient form of needlework, is thought to have originated in China, where the citizenry wore quilted clothing for centuries. The patchwork bedquilt, however, is uniquely North American.

In colonial times, when textiles were scarce, patchwork quilts were strictly utilitarian, and assembled from carefully-saved scraps of cloth. In later times, with more leisure and prosperity, the quilt became an ornament and artistic effort. In rural areas especially, the quilting bee continued well into the 20th century. The draw will be made late Sunday afternoon at the museum. Afternoon tea will be served in the main building, pop and

The idea was put forward by Coun. Roy Booth, who said people seem confused about regional councillors and local councillors. "It would be simpler to tell voters there are two councillors and an alderman in each ward," he said. Mayor Bill Smith agreed it was a good idea. He said people don't seem to understand the difference between a regional and local councillor. Coun. Ern Hyde urged the resolution to be sent to the other Halton municipalities immediately, so there would be a chance of the term alderman being used on the ballot in the Oct. 1 elections.
