Here's What to do If the Freezer Fails

At this time of the year, flash storms often account for power failures which may cause endless problems for the freezer owner. Food specialists at the Ontario food council, ministry of agriculture and food offer some advice as to whether to refreeze or discard the food in such an emergency.

The general rule "don't refreeze" appears on most commercially frozen food packages and is still the best advice. However, foods which you have frozen and have partially thawed, including vacuum packaged meat such as bacon, ham, and wieners, can be safely refrozen if there are ice crystals still present. This

Zeller's Sales Increased Report Says

Zeller's Limited reports a sales increase for the six months ending July, 1973, of 22.4 per cent and net income up by 17.6 per cent.

Sales for the first half of the 1973 fiscal year totalled \$124,182,041 which represents an increase in volume of \$22,687,769 over the comparable period last year. Net income for the period was \$2,739,972 which was equal, after payment of preferred share dividends, to 21 cents per common share compared to 18 cents a share in the corresponding period one year ago.

The 1973 expansion program will add 775,000 square feet to the company's gross store area in 11 large suburban department stores. At the end of July, 1973, five new stores had been opened and the remaining six new stores were under construction for opening during the third quarter. Two existing successful large stores are in the process of significant enlargement.

rule also applies to fruit, fruit pies, fruit juice concentrates, meat, poultry, fish, vegetables and "boil in bag" vegetables.

What is the fate of food which is completely thawed, but still very cold to the touch? It can all be safely refrozen, with exceptions. The first exception is vacuum packaged "boil in bag" vegetables which should be removed from their original package, cooked and eaten immediately or removed from the package, cooked, repackaged and refrozen. Another exception is commercially frozen soups requiring no further cooking. They should be discarded.

Food held at room temperature (68 to 72 degrees) for not longer than two hours, such as meat, poultry and vegetables should be cooked immediately and eaten, or cooked and refrozen. Vacuum packaged meat and fish should not be refrozen. Instead, cook immediately and eat. Homemade soups should be heated thoroughly and eaten, or heated and refrozen. Fruit, fruit pies and fruit juice concentrates can be safely refrozen.

If a fully loaded freezer stops operating, food will stay frozen about two days. Food in a partially loaded freezer will stay frozen for one day. If your freezer will not be operating within one or two days, place dry ice (25 to 50 pounds) in the freezer to hold the temperature down for two to four days.

Faba Beans Are Not The Answer

Faba beans, the new protein crop, felt by some people to be a cure to the world shortage of soybeans, can not be successfully grown in this part of the world, according to Halton Agricultural Representative Henry Stanley.

He told Halton county council's administration committee, last week, that Faba bean crops are susceptible to a number of factors here, which causes poor crops.

This year, \$83 million is going to be invested in helping people help themselves in their community.

If yours is a typical community, we're putting the "local" into the Local Initiatives Program by setting up a Constituency Advisory Group, or by having L.I.P. staff consult with already established groups. So now you help decide which projects will contribute most to everybody.

To qualify for L.I.P. funds, your project must create not less than 15 man-months of employment. Workers with

the skills required for your project must be available within your community. Project sponsors must hire all employees through Canada Manpower Centres. Deadline for applications is October 15th, 1973, though early submissions could result in projects starting as early as December 1st. In northern or isolated areas, projects could start as early as November 1st. Projects may be funded for up to six months.

There's Do-it-Yourself Business L.I.P., too, for companies which want to provide facilities or services for their communities. Projects are not to be related to business operations, and must create additional jobs.
