

NOMINATIONS COMPLETE

Six Regional Positions Filled By Acclamation

Vote In October Is Drawing Near

Six candidates for Oct. 1 regional elections were acclaimed Monday afternoon, when nominations closed at 5 p.m. with no names appearing in opposition.

Three regional councillors were elected by acclamation. Ric Morrow is regional councillor for Ward 4, (east of Rexway Drive), Ernest Sykes is regional councillor for Ward 3, (west of Rexway Drive), Len Coxie is regional councillor for Ward 3, (Esquesing).

Uncontested also were the school board seats. The three incumbents were re-elected with no opposition.

Ernie Bodnar is the public school trustee for Wards 3 and 4 (the whole of Georgetown), Hartley Sherk is the separate school trustee for the same area, and Tom E. Watson is the public school trustee for Wards 1 and 2 (Acton and Esquesing).

A four-way race for mayor of the north should stir up interest in the elections. Tom Hill, at present reeve of Esquesing; William R. Smith, now mayor of Georgetown, and two Georgetown councillors Philip Siddall and William F. Hunter, will fight it out for the top northern post.

In Ward 3, the part of Georgetown west from Rexway to the western boundaries, two sitting members of Georgetown council, Roy Booth and Ern Hyde, and a past councillor member John Hole, will battle



McIntyre Petition Asks For New Road

Residents of McIntyre Crescent say they feel their road should receive the same complete reconstruction as Prince Charles Drive, and Mountainview Road.

A petition, signed by 52 residents and presented to council last week by Jim Kennedy, asked for storm sewers, curbs, gutters, and resurfacing, instead of the two-inch overlay, scheduled for that road.

"Is there a chance the street could get the overlay, whether the taxpayers want it or not?" asked Mr. Kennedy.

Mayor Bill Smith said the tender call had been accepted, but said the matter would be left with the works committee and Mr. Kennedy told when the committee would meet.

Coun. Ern Hyde said the tarring and chipping done some years ago on many streets has worn out, and is now costing a great deal to maintain.

DEVELOPER PROPOSES

240 Unit Condominium On Ontario Street Site

A 15 acre site on Ontario Street, may be the site of a 240 unit condominium development, if all approvals are forthcoming.

O. Romanyk of Alliance Building Corp. Ltd. told council last week, his company planned to build 12 or 13 units, to the acre, in two phases, completing one half before starting the second phase.

The land runs back from Ontario Street, into Esquesing over high rolling ground.

Mr. Romanyk showed a conceptual plan, preserving a growth of mature trees.

He said the company has made application for rezoning from R3 to R4 to allow multiple-family housing. Mr. Romanyk told council he was aware there are no services on Ontario Street and asked for proposals regarding the servicing.

Coun. Phil Siddall said he understands the management of large condominiums has become unweildy.

"Chinguously advises no more than 40 units under one management," he commented.

Mr. Romanyk replied that there would be more than one condominium corporation. "We find the ideal number is between 60 and 80 so every resident becomes involved."

Council referred the matter to planning board, with no further comment.

3-Vehicle Monday Mishap Sends Two to Hospital

A three-vehicle collision at Guelph Street and Mountainview Road, Monday at 11:42 a.m. sent two people to hospital and caused a total of \$1,650 damage.

A station wagon, driven by Allan Grath of Toronto, made a left turn in front of a truck, driven by Herbert McDougall of Acton, and owned by Lane's Transport, hitting it in the right side.

The impact sent the truck into a car driven by Daisy Harris, Lot 18, Con. 8, Esquesing. The Harris car was stopped for a red light.

Both Mr. Grath and Mr. McDougall were taken to Georgetown hospital by ambulance, suffering cuts and bruises. Mrs. Harris was uninjured.

Damage to the station wagon amounted to \$1,200, to the truck, \$200 and to the Harris car \$250.

Five-year-old Michael Curry, 92 Main St. N., escaped with slight injury to his ankle, after he ran around the front of a school bus into the path of a car, Wednesday afternoon.

He got off the Holy Cross school bus at Main and Ewing, and ran into the side of a car driven by Josef Hoedl, 20 Marilyn Dr.

Mr. Hoedl took the little boy home.

The same intersection, Main and Ewing, was the scene of a traffic mishap the following day, when cars driven by John Placido, 16 Sargent Rd., and Allan Francis, Fifth Line, Limehouse, collided.

Damage to the Placido car amounted to \$300 and to the Francis car, \$50.

A crash at Main Street south and Maple Avenue, Friday morning, at 10:45 caused a total of \$400 damage. A car driven by Arnel Hache, 14 Gower Ct., received \$100 damage to the front left fender and headlights, and a car driven by Maxine Pemberton, 107 Raylawn Cres., received \$300 damage to the rear left fender and door.

Aase Jorgensen, 3 Bennet Pl., Glen Williams, was taken to hospital by Georgetown ambulance, last Friday, suffering cuts, bruises and shock, after a collision at Guelph Street and Maple Avenue.

The late model Jorgensen car, had over \$2,000 damage to the right front door and fender, while the other car, driven by June V. Longstreet of Erin, had \$1,100 damage to the hood, grill and fender.

NEWS IN BRIEF

GEORGETOWN FIREFIGHTERS and firefighters from throughout the Humber-Credit Firefighters Association region will march in a church parade here, Sunday. Georgetown Girls Pipe Band will lead the procession from the fire hall to Knox Presbyterian Church. The parade will be followed by a Georgetown Fire Department family picnic in Cedarvale Community Park.

GEORGETOWN GIRLS' Pipe Band may have its town grant appeal from \$500 to \$1,500, if a recommendation of the finance committee is passed by council. The finance committee decided to give the girl's band the amount the Georgetown Citizens' Band received when it was in operation.

GEORGETOWN FIRE Department may use the old sewage disposal plant property, adjacent to Cedarvale Community Centre, for training purposes, until the use of the property is decided.

GEORGETOWN MEMORIAL Arena manager Don Goeling told The Herald, yesterday, he expects to have an ice surface ready in time to offer public skating Saturday or Sunday. Ice-making operations started Monday and have been progressing well because of the current cool temperatures.

60 Launch North Halton Contact Centre

A public meeting to launch the North Halton Contact Centre got off to a good start last week, when 60 persons turned out to hear the outline of the project and training course.

Executive committee chairman Rev. Walter Ridley chaired the meeting, and explained the idea for the centre came from the YMCA Social Services committee.

Mr. Ridley stressed the fact volunteers are not professionals, not psychologists, but simply "neighbors to one another."

Rev. Peter Barrow, chairman of the training committee, outlined the nine-week course for volunteers, which will include information, discussion, and lectures on such topics as marriage, family problems, alcohol, drugs, law and the citizen, the elderly and shut-in, credit, and finances.

Five hundred books of prize lists were printed and it is Mrs. Milne's job to mail 400 of them to people all over the province.

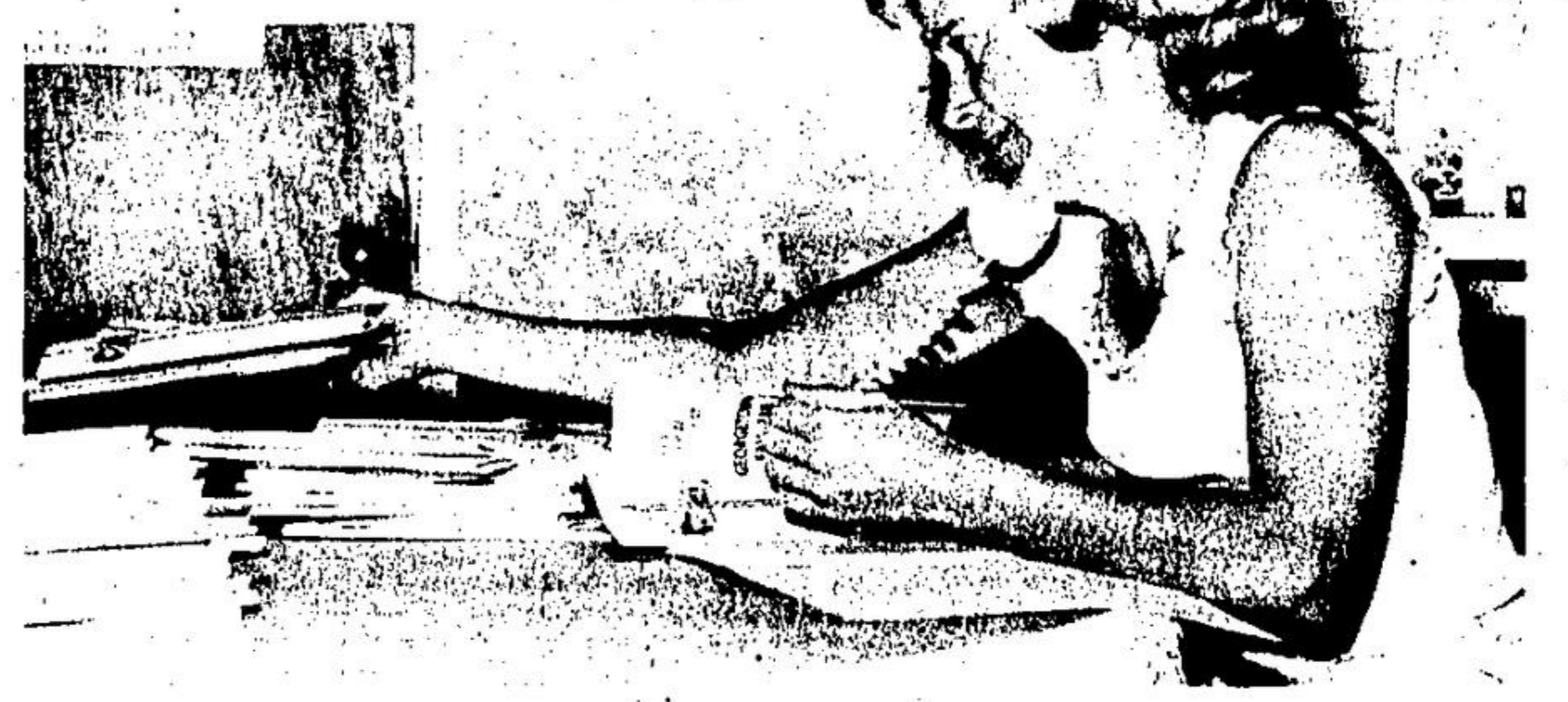
Anyone who has shown in the fair in the last few years receives one, plus many others who may be interested.

When the fair is over and everything is packed up, the secretary's job is not finished. The prize money has to be sent to all winners and the bookkeeping started. The board then knows how much was spent on each event.
