

MASSON TELLS ESQUESING

North Not Being Considered For Halton Headquarters Site

Township council last week that Acton, Georgetown and Esquesing have not been considered by a special county committee that is seeking sites for a new regional ad-

ministration centre. He said the search has been concentrated in the northern rural areas of Burlington and Oakville and in Milton, all areas that are close to the county population centre. Mr. Masson made the

statement during a visit to Esquesing council. He said he came "just to explain my job." "I'm really just a working guy trying to put together a working framework," he said, noting that his position is contrary to talk in the county and concern over the extent of

his power. SKELETON

"I'm trying to put together the skeleton of regional government," he said. "Frankly, I hope the people buy the skeleton (at the Oct. 1 election) and put the meat on it. In response to questioning by Esquesing councillors, Mr. Masson said he felt the present administration centre located in Milton should be vacated by the regional government. The building, now owned by the

county and leased in part to the province, is currently occupied in 80 per cent of its area by legal facilities, and in only 20 per cent by county offices.
"I think it would be cheaper to convert 20 per cent to the courts than to convert the rest for the region," Mr. Masson said. He noted, however, that a final decision on the location must be made by the new


