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**MASSON TELLS ESQUESING**

**North Not Being Considered For Halton Headquarters Site**

Allan Masson, Halton Region chairman, told Esquesing Township council last week that Acton, Georgetown and Esquesing have not been considered by a special county committee that is seeking sites for a new regional administration centre.

He said the search has been concentrated in the northern rural areas of Burlington and Oakville and in Milton, all areas that are close to the county population centre.

Mr. Masson made the statement during a visit to Esquesing council. He said he came "just to explain my job."

"I'm really just a working guy trying to put together a working framework," he said, noting that his position is contrary to talk in the county and concern over the extent of his power.

**SKELETON**

"I'm trying to put together the skeleton of regional government," he said. "Frankly, I hope the people buy the skeleton (at the Oct. 1 election) and put the meat on it."

In response to questioning by Esquesing councillors, Mr. Masson said he felt the present administration centre located in Milton should be vacated by the regional government. The building, now owned by the county and leased in part to the province, is currently occupied in 80 per cent of its area by legal facilities, and in only 20 per cent by county offices.

"I think it would be cheaper to convert 20 per cent to the courts than to convert the rest for the region," Mr. Masson said. He noted, however, that a final decision on the location must be made by the new

council when it assumes power in January.

**CRAMPED**

He warned that the new government would be faced with a year's period of time before it could purchase new property and before a new building could be constructed. He said conditions at the present building would be "cramped" until that move can be made.

Mr. Masson said the council will begin work quickly after it is elected Oct. 1. Although it will not assume office until January in the new year.

"We'll make resolutions, vote on them, and adopt them from October to December," he said.

"On Jan. 1, we'll pull the trigger to enact all we've accomplished."

Much of the council's preliminary work will be to hire staff and enact procedural bylaws, he said.

The region will employ 500 staff members but Mr. Masson said at least half of that number will be police officers.

**GRADUALLY**

Although a regional police force will eventually govern the entire area, Mr. Masson said Ontario Provincial Police now on duty in northern municipal areas will be phased out gradually, over as much as four years.

He said he was advised in

Nassagaweya Township and in Acton that "people like the service they're getting from the OPP."

Esquesing councillors confirmed that a similar sentiment exists in this township. The working staff of the regional government will first be considered by a provincially appointed selection board which will make recommendations to the regional council.

In response to questioning, Mr. Masson said that municipal administration heads may make recommendations to the board, but he added that candidates from Halton must compete with applications

coming from outside the county.

"If they look at one, they're going to look at all of them," Mr. Masson said. He added, however, that all other factors being equal, a local person would be chosen over an outsider.

The new council will be inaugurated Oct. 18, at a gala ceremony in Burlington. Mr. Masson explained that only in that community are facilities large enough to handle an expected crowd of 1,500. Half of the crowd will receive invitations, he said, the rest will come as guests of the invited.

**Play It Safe On School Bus**

Students are reminded that a bicycle is a vehicle and is subject to the Highway Traffic Act, provincial rules of the road and local bylaws.

To meet the standards of the law, a bicycle must have a bell or horn in good working condition. If it is used between dusk and dawn, it must have a white light in front, and red light or reflector at the rear. Reflective tape must also be applied — white on the front forks and red on the rear fender.

Riders should follow these safety tips:

1. Keep control, don't weave or stunt.
2. Drive on the right near the curb.
3. Check for traffic before

making left turns.

4. Make right turns near the curb.
5. Dismount and walk across busy streets and intersections.
6. Give proper hand signals.
7. Never more than one on a bike.
8. Know and obey traffic signs.
9. Never hitch on a moving vehicle.
10. Always drive in single file.
11. Obey police and school patrols.
12. Check in all directions before entering a street or highway.
13. Never insist on the right-of-way — a bicycle is very fragile compared to an automobile.
14. Carry books or parcels in a carrier — if no carrier, tie or strap books firmly to the handlebars.
15. Always give proper and clear signals in time to warn others of your intentions.
16. Make sure the bike is in good mechanical condition.
