

EFCO Amazing Pundits Gain Industrial Final

Monday night, Efco out-slugged Flyers 14-10 to qualify for the league finals. Jim King was the winning pitcher in that one and in Sunday night's tilt

when Efco trounced Flyers 16-3.

At press time their final position was still undecided. Casselman Fuels thumped Tokers 8-0, Monday night, to knot that semi-finals set at two games apiece. The deciding clash was slated for last night.

Tempers flared in this one and both benches emptied briefly at one point, but there was no altercation. Gerry Sproat pitched the shutout.

Tokers had taken a lead in the series, Sunday night, by edging Casselman 8-7 after trailing for most of the game.

Flyers captured the first game of their series 3-0 with

Ray See tossing the shutout, but the tide started to turn when Efco won game two 10-7 with Dave Garland throwing in place of their regular hurler.

Bob Fendley was at his best when Tokers opened that series with a 3-2 win. But Sproat had Tokers' number in game two when Casselman's rolled to a 13-1 triumph.

To gain the semi-finals Tokers ousted Norval in five games. Efco eliminated Combines in four. Flyers bounced Erin in five, and Casselman dumped A's Custom Meats three straight.

The finals will likely start tonight in Glen Williams park.

Minor Hockey House Leagues Get New Division Names

Twenty changes in the Georgetown and District Minor Hockey Association's constitution were made at a general meeting in Centennial Public School, Sept. 5.

Six major alterations are of particular interest to the general public. Noticeable this winter will be the absence of the old Junior A, American League, Little NHL, and Senior A designations for house leagues. They have been

replaced with Atom, Pee-wee, Bantam, and Midget the new labels.

Tykes have become paperweights, and a new house league for 17 and 18-year-olds will be referred to as Juvenile.

Externally-worn mouth guards have been made compulsory for paperweights, atoms and pee-wees.

In the last two minutes of play in each period no line changes may be made during

stoppages in play. They are still permitted while play is in progress, however. This applies to all leagues and is being introduced to eliminate stalling tactics.

A rule stating that players found using profane language, alcohol or cigarettes will be dealt with severely by the executive has been changed in that smoking has been deleted.

"Derived from the Little

NHL" is a phrase that will be added to the organization's letterheads, below Georgetown and District Minor Hockey Association, to keep a reference to the Little NHL alive in its birthplace.

A rule stipulating that coaches and managers are ineligible to sit on the executive had been softened allowing them to accept a position when it has been left open.

Falcons spotted the home side an early goal, but deadlocked it when Jim Clarke scored just prior to half time.

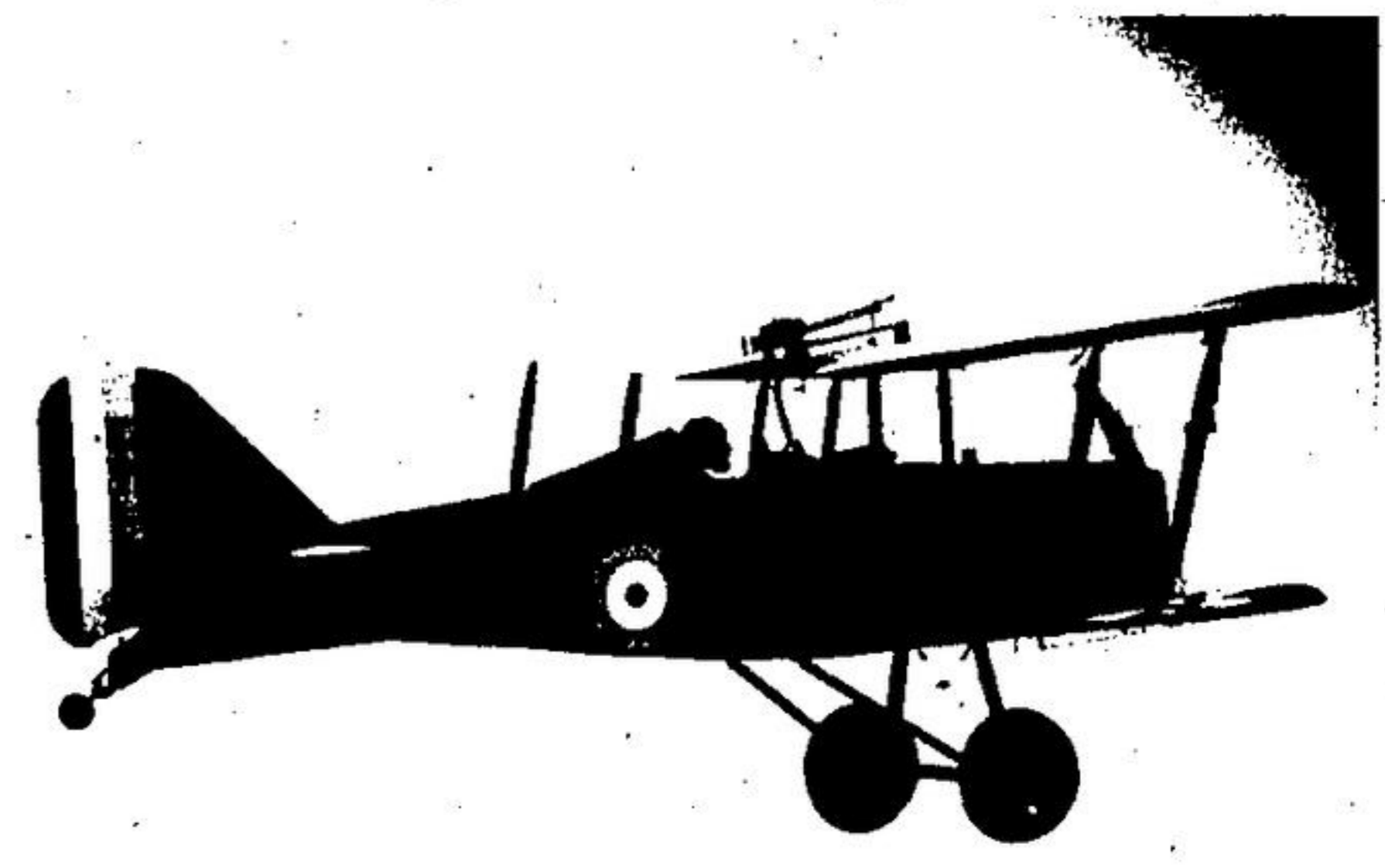
Falcons' strong defensive game secured the tie.
