Tower May Rise On R R 1 Farm

The destiny of the tower of the Canadian National Railway station at Acton has been altered. It was purchased by LaVerne Lipsett who cut it where necessary, numbered the sections and pieces, and removed it to his property north of Georgetown.

Eventually, the Lipsetts hope to reassemble the tower, but they have not decided whether they will set it up as a lighthouse in which to watch for ships in Esquesing Township or a cozy dining nook. Their children, Steven, 7, and Tiffany, 4, are in favor of using it as their private rocket ship.

Fortunately, Mr. Lipsett was on his holidays when he saw that the station had been partially torn down and he was able to buy the tower from the new station owner and to start work on its removal. But when the time came to lift off the roof of the tower all the owners of cranes and boom trucks he contacted seemed to be tied up for the long Labor Day weekend

With the loan of a wagon from Scotsdale Farm, RR1, Georgetown, and the volunteer help of two neighbors, Peter Walton and Frank Van DeValk, the tower was transported to No. 27 Sideroad, Esquesing Township.

Since their 25 acres already has historical merit in that it William Johnson, president of the Group United Against Rural belonged to the late Col.
Ballantine and its four stone buildings (not counting a little stone dog house) were built from limestone quarried on the site, it seemed that the acquisition of the Acton station's tower would preserve more of the history of Halton County. But the Lipsett property lies on the Niagara escarpment so the tower will probably tie dismantled until the future of the land is determined by the government.




