

## Raiders Now Affiliated With Allen Cup Champs

Ontario Hockey Association's intermediate A provincial champions, the Georgetown Raiders, start practising in preparation for the 1973-74 season, Sunday.

"This team is going to be much stronger than last year's," executive member Dave Kentner told The Herald this week. "We can't reveal names yet, but we'll have some additions to the team that will help us in a big way," he said. Gerry Inglis has agreed to coach the club again this season. He retired from his bench duties at the start of last season, but got back into the

thick of things in time to take the Raiders to their second straight Ontario title. Raiders were affiliated with Oakville's senior Oaks last year, before that club packed it in. Oakville is putting together an intermediate A entry for this season and will be one of the five clubs Raiders will be playing against in the Niagara District Intermediate A League.

Raiders' president Will Brownlow just recently filed affiliation papers with the Allen Cup champions, Orillia Terriers, a fact which hasn't hurt the optimism of the executive. First test for the 1973-74 edition of the Georgetown Raiders will be in Dundas, Oct. 12, when they open the schedule. First Raider home game is slated for Oct. 19

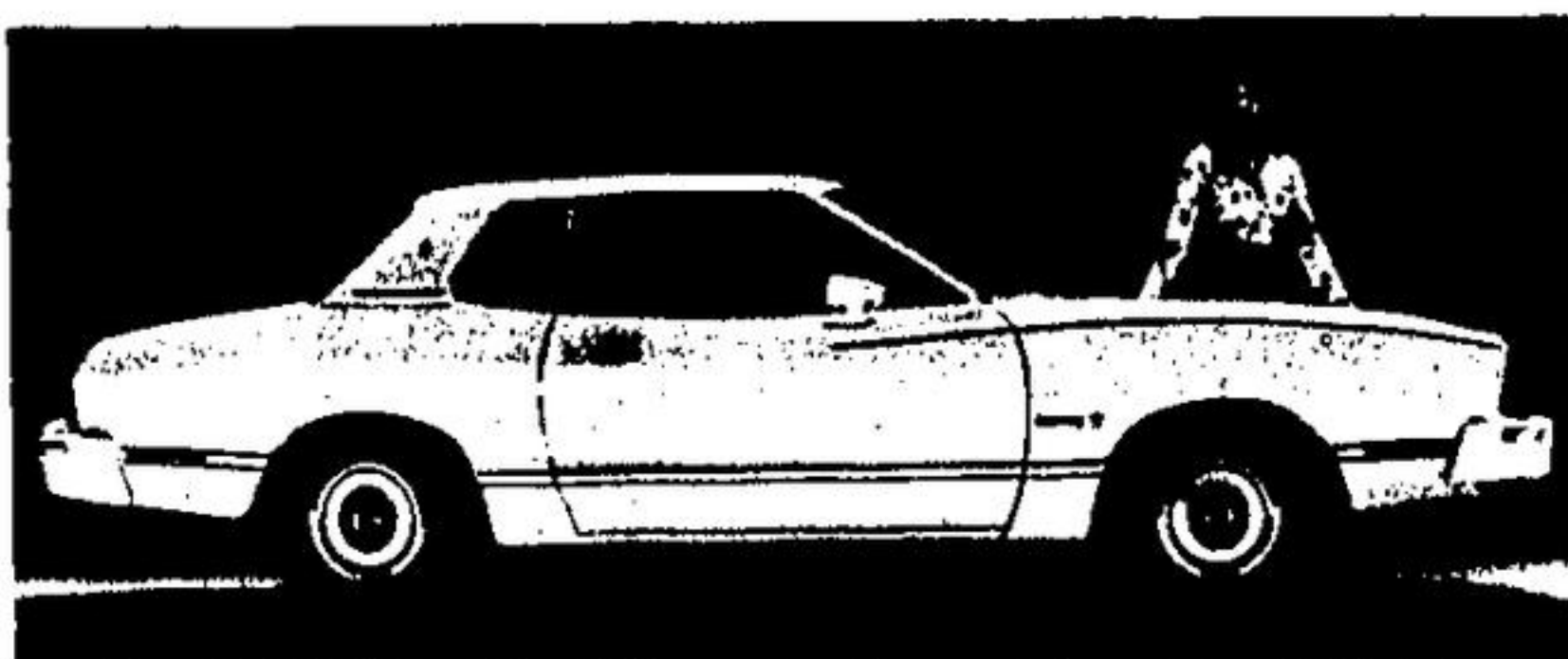
