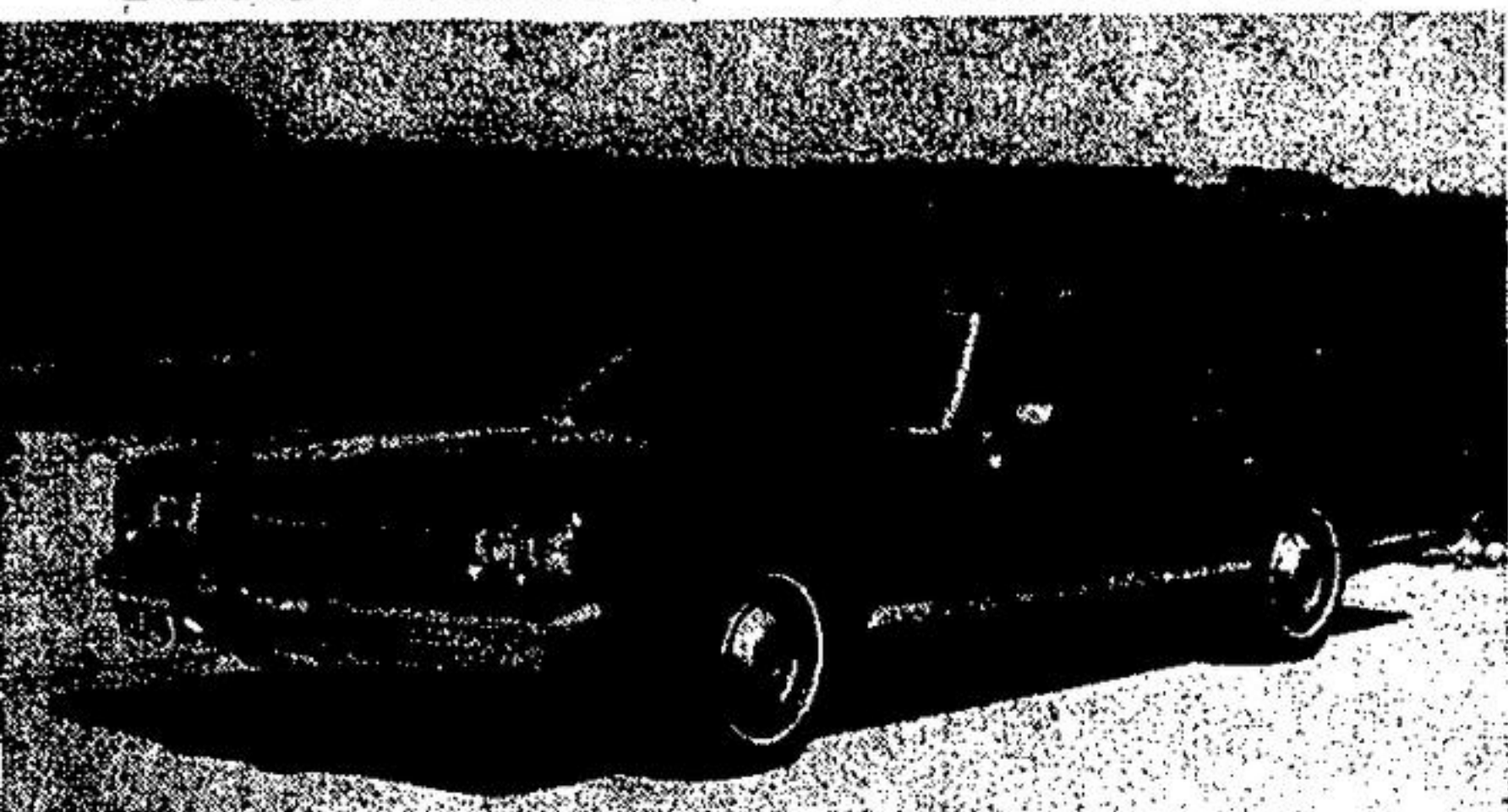


**OGLING THE 74's**

**DODGE MONACO — PLYMOUTH FURY**

Wheelbase on the popular full-sized Plymouth has been increased a full two inches to 122 inches on sedans and hardtops and 124 inches on station wagons. Over-all length has been reduced 0.5 inches. The totally restyled '74 Fury has a lowered beltline which results in increased glass area for improved all-around visibility. Inside there is improved headroom, more entrance and footroom and a quieter ride. The all-new body gives Fury a sleeker look, yet retains all of the comfort expected of a full-sized car. Plymouth Fury's distinctive new fine-line grille is of bright, extruded aluminum. Thirteen models will be available in Fury I, II, III, Suburban, Custom Suburban, Sport Suburban, Fury Gran Coupe (shown here), and Fury Gran Sedan. A Fury II two-door hardtop is available along with four-door sedans in Fury I and Fury II series. Then there is a two-door hardtop, four-door sedan and four-door hardtop in the Fury III lineup.
