He used as an example the village of Hornby, which has a post office. Most of its service is to the south, which will be in the new municipality of Central Halton, while Hornby itself will be in North Halton.

Similarly, post offices will continue in service Limehouse and Glen Williams. Mr. Marshall said it is possible to predict that changes might have to be made in the distant future, but there are no
