MUSEUM NOTES

Heritage Halton Art Is Weekend's Feature

Halton County Museum, Kelso Park, Milton, will host the Heritage Halton Art Contest this weekend. Originated by county warden Mrs. Anne MacArthur, the contest has 76 entries in three categories, watercolor, oilpainting, and photography. Judging will take place at the museum Friday by Oakville residents Mrs. Florence Myers, Mrs. Waywell, and Harry Howard.

All entries will be on display at the museum Saturday and Sunday, and complimentary tea will be served from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The entire museum complex will be open to weekend visitors. The Halton Region Conservation Authority has removed its Kelso admission fee until next spring, and museum ad-

mission will be free for this special event.

PHAETON

An interesting phaeton is on display in the museum's carriage house—a gift from Mrs. A. V. Young of Beckett's Drive, Hamilton. This carriage is unique, having been designed by Mrs. Young for her honeymoon in 1911. Built at the carriage works on MacNab Street, Hamilton, it has wicker fenders and dashboard. Its canopy is patent leather, and the original paint and stripping remain in almost perfect condition.

The carriage was made with shafts as well as a tongue so that it could be pulled by a carriage horse or Mrs. Young's favorites, matched ponies. The whip holder was purposely eliminated as Mrs.

Young disapproved of that method of encouragement.

This phaeton is indeed special, costing \$600 to construct. In its 1895 catalogue Montgomery Ward and Co. advertised phaetons at \$70—the body is hung low, making it very easy of access. Very popular with ladies, elderly persons and physicians. Phaetons were available from Sears, Roebuck in 1908 for \$61.95. They had oval edge steel tires. Rubber tires were \$14.95 extra!

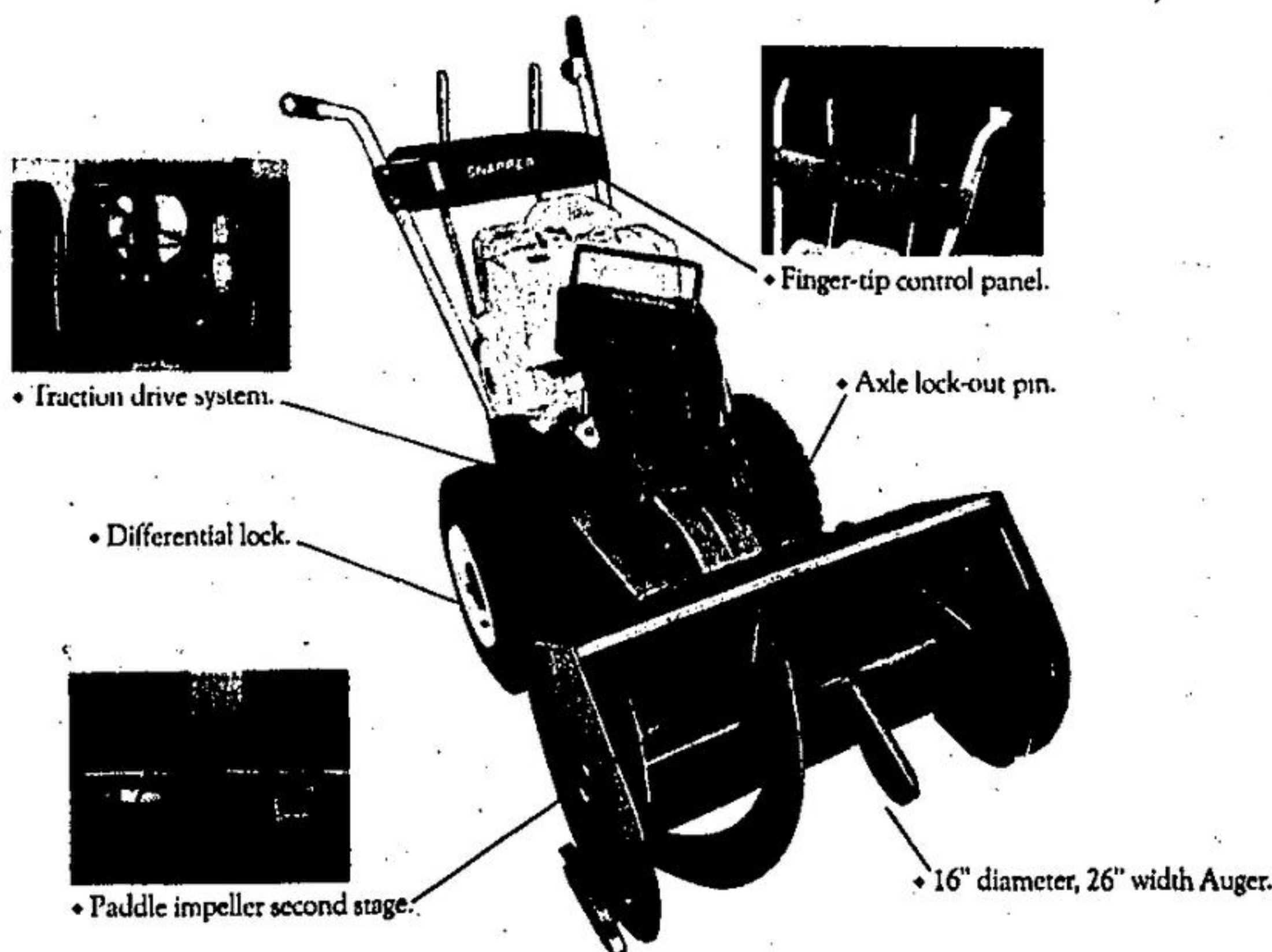

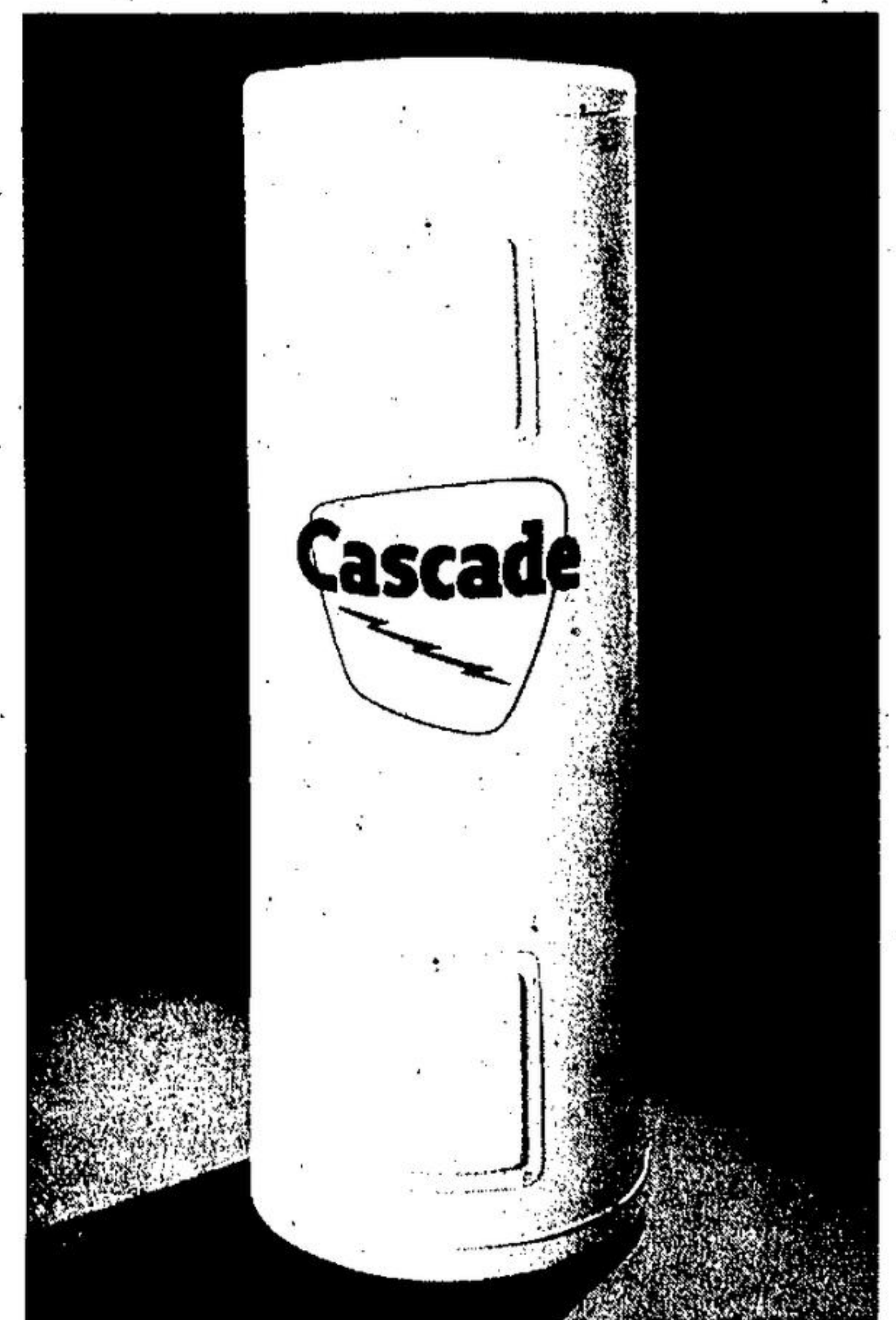
