Contact Centre Gets Under Way

The North Halton Contact Centre is an organization of telephone volunteers, who listen to people in crisis situations, and offer help on two levels: first, as a referral to the appropriate individuals, organizations and agencies, prepared to assist in specific areas, and secondly, by being a telephone friend, listening, and responding to the needs of the caller. Two important requirements for the centre to become a reality are: one, volunteers for telephone duty, who will be asked to participate in a nine week training course, two, financial assistance to launch the telephone service. Initially, an amount of \$1,000 is needed, and an annual income of \$2,400 would maintain the service.

The Contact Centre will be a non-denominational service, serving as a listening post, and referral station, staffed by trained volunteers, prepared to help deal with people of all ages, assisting with possible solutions for problems ranging from, loneliness, marital, parental, alcohol, drug or emotional distress. A resource file, containing general information, in respect to, recreation, groups, and organizations, connected with

community interests, will also be available to the caller. The course will touch on all the above topics, under the direction of Rev. Peter Barrow, and Rev. Walter Ridley. Also, with the aid of qualified speakers, an insight to these many problems, will be realized. The first course, in progress, is being held on Tuesday evenings, in The Harrison Public School library, from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m., the second course beginning Thursday, Oct. 25, at the same location and time. All interested persons, over the age of 17, are welcome to attend. The confidence and concern for others, are essential qualities, needed by all our volunteers, projecting the air of an understanding, and sympathetic listener—a friend to the caller. The volunteer is asked to complete an application form,

including the names and addresses of two people willing to give references. Attendance at the nine week course, is required, followed by a six month probation period, during telephone duty. The volunteers time schedule is optional to suit his or her convenience. Volunteers are needed as well, to provide transportation in town, and anyone interested in providing a baby-sitting service, or has knowledge of such. We hope to have enough volunteers to staff, two people per shift. The premises will be kept locked at all times, and at the present, will not be a drop-in centre, but strictly a telephone service. The hours per shift, on a 24 hour period, will be: 7-11 a.m., 11-3 p.m., 3-7 p.m., 7-11 p.m., 11-7 a.m., and a cot will be provided for those persons interested in the over-night shift. A temporary location for the centre

may be necessary, until suitable accommodation is available. Any suggestions in this regard, would be appreciated.

Please note, that the new course will begin next Thursday evening, October 25th at 8 p.m., in the Harrison School library. This will be your last chance this year to become involved in the training sessions for the opening of the Contact Centre, Nov. 15.

Before the centre opens, a more complete list of questions and answers will be published in The Herald, pertaining to The Contact Centre, its volunteers, professional counselling and the actual handling of telephone calls.
