Contract Awarded For Bronte Park

Jim Snow, MPP, Halton East, and Minister of Government Services, said today that a \$454,000 contract has been awarded to All-Weather Asphalt Mix Limited, Box 550, Oakville, for construction of roads and two large parking lots, area grading, ditching and culverts in Bronte Creek Provincial Park, for the Ministry of Natural Resources. All-Weather Asphalt Mix submitted the lowest of three bids received, the high being \$843,225. The roads and associated work represent the second major contract in developing the park, where five buildings are nearing completion. The work, already well under way, is sited in the southwest quadrant of the 2,000 acre park near the Towns of Burlington and Oakville, and will provide internal road access, divided by a central median strip, and entry off Hurlock Drive. The contract covers the first stage of granular material construction, with asphalt surfacing and additional parking lots scheduled for a later date. Work on this contract is expected to be complete by November 30, 1973, weather permitting.
