Income Shy of Expenses By \$8,500 Says Brock

"The Georgetown Y needs \$8,500 or it can't operate," says Doug Brock, campaign co-ordinator of the Georgetown YMCA-YWCA's drive for funds. To prove his point, he produced the proposed operating budget for 1974.

"See," he pointed out, "income—\$30,230. Expenses—\$38,750. Deficit—\$8,520."

This year the Georgetown Y is putting all the financial facts before the people. It has itemized expenses, incomes and programs in a folder which should be in everybody's mailbox before the campaign canvasser calls. It hopes this will show people why it is campaigning for funds. Too often in the past, the hapless canvasser has been met at the door with an angry "What? Give to the Y? Hah! They should be rich. They charge



enough for their programs!" "The truth is we don't charge enough for our programs," said Doug. "Our fees barely cover the cost of instructors, hall rentals, buses, equipment. Our fees don't cover administration costs, salaries, office rent."

The Y rents a store-front office and employs two people part-time. Mrs. Jo Lister and Mrs. Mary Livingstone keep the 20 Y programs, with 1,200 participants, operating smoothly.

INITIATE PROGRAMS
The Y does a lot of ex-

perimenting. It absorbs the financial risk while a program proves itself. Then, when it's financially independent, it encourages the program to operate separately. Judo and Olympic gymnastics are two Y-initiated programs which are now on their own, or operating under the municipal recreation program.

There are over 100 dedicated Y volunteers, but these volunteers concern themselves mainly with the social action end of the Y.

"That's another thing people seem to forget at campaign time," said Doug. "The social action the Y does. Some of our members have been very active with the clergy in setting up the telephone contact centre. Others work with senior citizens and the handicapped. All make use of the office and the staff hired by the Y."
