Combines Need Repairs During Off-Season

Most of the wear and tear on combine equipment occurs during the harvest season. The 9 or 10 months combines stand idle, may also cause serious deterioration, advises Hal Wright, secretary-manager, Farm Machinery Board, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Youth Travel Idea Studied

OTTAWA—A recommendation of the Town of Georgetown concerning provision of continuing accommodation for youth travelling through Canada is being considered by the federal government.

The engine should be run long enough to warm the crankcase oil. Stop the engine and drain the crankcase oil so that all the impurities are removed. Fill with new oil and replace the oil filter. The cooling system should also be drained and flushed. Refill it with an anti-freeze solution. If the cooling system is left dry, rust flakes form inside the engine, possibly plugging the radiator next season. After refilling with an anti-freeze solution, run the engine for a few minutes to mix the coolant thoroughly and to force oil throughout the channels.

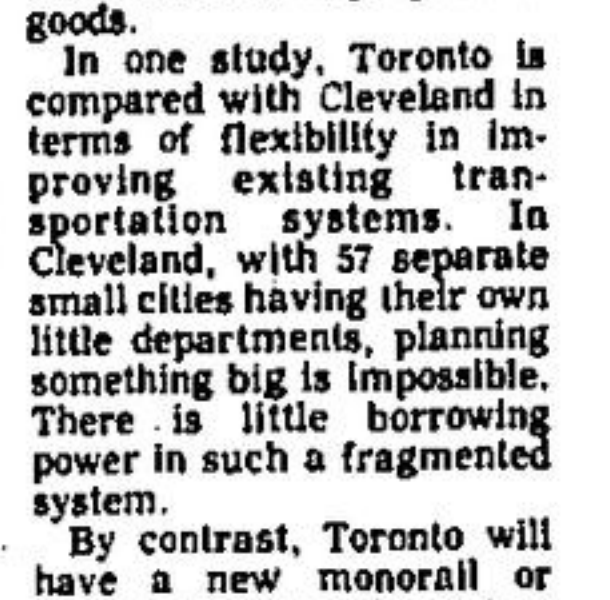
Urban Traffic Problems Need Mobility Answers
