

Vandals Attack Park And Destroy Property

The other night, Belfountain Conservation Area was visited by some of those so-called "fun people" bent on destruction.

Credit Valley Conservation Authority staff had left a large tractor parked near the service building and returned the next morning to find the wiring torn out and other damage done, rendering the tractor inoperable. Cost of repairs was \$300, plus the time lost having the repairs completed.

Other recent damage done includes a slab door on the Belfountain washroom broken where someone had forced it open; windows broken, roof and plumbing damaged at the Meadowdale Conservation Area; signs torn down and scenic route signs sawed off, broken off and stolen; trees demolished that took 100 years to grow; tables cut up and burned or thrown into the river or lakes; chains cut and gates broken in many Conservation Areas.

Much of this vandalism is of a petty nature but requires massive amounts of staff time to repair or replace.

Those using the authority parks sometimes complain about the cost of entry. In any given year the cost of vandalism runs into thousands of dollars in staff time and materials. Missing trees and shrubs are irreplaceable.

It is not considered fair to the responsible citizen to have to pay for damage done by those who ruin open space areas bought and paid for with the public tax dollar. As long as the vandalism continues it will be reflected in the entry fees paid by all of the people who enjoy the Authority Conservation areas along the Credit Valley.
