

### 1974 Trees Are Ordered

Several landowners in the Credit River watershed have already ordered about 50,000 trees to be planted by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority in the spring of 1974. Each authority in Ontario has a quota of trees available from the ministry of natural resources nurseries and there are only approximately six weeks in April and May when planting and staff coincide.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority accepts applications from landowners who are willing to plant a minimum of 3,000 trees on a first come first serve basis. Cost is \$15 per thousand for machine planted trees and \$25 per thousand for hand planted trees. Interested landowners who would like trees planted in 1974 should contact the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Meadowdale, Ontario, L4J 1K0 or call 451-1615 and ask for a private land reforestation assistance form.
