RAIDER VICTORY Oakville Adanacs Tumbled By Hot Georgetown Squad

The Raiders put an end to their losing streak, Friday, when they finished on top by a score of 4-3 against the Oakville Adanacs. In the past week, the Raiders lost twice to the Port Colbourne Sailors and once to Oakville, but finally turned about to down Oakville on home ice.

Last Sunday, their loss to Oakville was mainly due to good goal tending by the Adanacs. The score was 7-4 for Oakville.

The upswing on Friday could have been because of the return of Paul Robinson to the team, or it might have been luck. With heavy penalizing against Georgetown and the advantage given the Adanacs, it must have been Raider skill and teamwork that gave them the lead. More likely, their latest victory was an even blend of all these things.

The action began when Ray Evans won the first faceoff and shot the puck from centre to Jim Blair on the left. Blair drew the Oakville defence to the left and shot the puck into the crease. To the astonishment of the Adanac goalie and everyone else present, the puck was deflected off Jeff Nicholson's skate and into the net.

Georgetown had scored on the first play of the game.

Oakville got its first goal later in the first period and its second goal in the second period. Its second goal was on a power play by Adams and went in at 13:36. Two Georgetown players were in the penalty box at the time. The Raiders came back at 16:39 to tie the game 2-2.

GOAL SCORED
Dwayne Rutley carried the puck to the corner in a power play and passed to Bill Currie. Currie shot and Jim Prosser deflected the puck into the net. There were no other goals in the second period.

In the third period, Bill Currie got the puck behind the Oakville net, shortly after the faceoff and passed to Paul Robinson. The recent addition to the team carried the puck up the left wing and made a drop pass to Dwayne Rutley who shot the puck into the top left corner of the net. It was only 4:36.

The fourth and final Raider goal was a rare one. About halfway through the period, there was a faceoff at the Oakville blue line. Jim Mora won it for the Raiders and passed to Jeff Nicholson. Nicholson took a slapshot, which passed over the goalie's head and bounced off the screen. It was picked up by Ray Evans and forced past the confused Adanac goalie, into the net. The crowd went wild! It was a little like a goal made by Dryden in the Canada-Russia series.

ONE MORE GOAL
The Raiders had an almost sure win since they were leading 4-2 at 15:55. But at the end of the third period, Georgetown was penalized heavily. There were seven Raider penalties in the last nine minutes of the game and none for Oakville. Even the Raider goalie was penalized for picking up the puck. For most of the last nine minutes, Georgetown was two men short. At 18:12 Oakville forced the puck into the Raider net, while three Raiders watched from the penalty box.

Considering that at most times Georgetown was one or two men short, the Raiders played exceptionally well. They dominated the playing throughout the game, even though Oakville had 33 shots on goal compared to Georgetown's 32 attempts. There was even a fight to heighten the Raider-fever in the crowd.

Here are some of the next Raider games. Friday the Raiders meet Fort Erie on home ice, and Sunday they travel to Oakville. Every Friday there will be a home game at the arena, for the remainder of November. On Nov. 14, there will be a home game, an exhibition match.

Students Stage Chariot Race
