New Bridge Needs Lights

How are Norval residents reacting to the new highway bridge? Is there a need for traffic lights near the bridge? "No question about it," said Miss B.M. Barnes of Norval. "There should be traffic lights at the crossroads." "There has been a need for traffic lights now for some time," Miss Barnes said. "Sometimes it is almost impossible for a pedestrian to cross the road." Dim Wittkeok thinks traffic lights would be helpful. "It is hard to say what the effects of traffic lights would have on traffic flow through Norval," he said. "Now it might cause problems with heavy traffic, but the lights would make traffic go slower. I believe that there are more cars travelling at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour now than there were before the new bridge was built."

"I also think that lights would be helpful to elderly people and small children who have to cross the road," Mr. Wittkeok said. "This would certainly be a factor in a decision to erect signals."

Mrs. Ormie Carter, Norval, thinks that traffic signals which operate at certain times of the day might be the answer. "We need traffic lights at certain times of the day," Mrs. Carter said. "During rush hours in the morning and afternoon, some people, especially older people, just cannot cross the road."

"Signal" lights would allow people to cross the road, but on the other hand, traffic might jam up," she said. "Lights would also cause the trucks to gear up and down all through the night. A flashing light might be the best solution."

Both Mrs. Carter and Mr. Wittkeok think the new bridge is an improvement over the old one.

"It looks much better than the old one," Mr. Wittkeok said. "I like it." Mrs. Carter added that Norval residents were beginning to get used to the new bridge now that crews were landscaping the area.

"It is quite an improvement," she said.

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1974 Dates Are Chosen For Annual Fall Fair

At its first meeting since a successful Georgetown fall fair was held at the end of September, the directors set their sights on next year's exhibition, and took note of a number of suggestions for production in the week's ahead.

The secretary reported that the gate receipts topped \$4,000 this year, and of this amount, \$3,700 will be paid in prize money.

It was agreed that the pet show, Old MacDonald's Farm and the rock group should be encouraged, because they were highlights of this year's show. Happyland Midway Show was retained again for 1974 with an increased payment to the fair board.

The prize list for cattle classes will be revised, because this section of the fair fell far short of expectations. It is hoped that local cattle exhibitors will see fit to return to the Georgetown fair next year.

It was felt that publicity

about entries in the women's and juniors' section was lacking, and plans will be formulated to give these better publicity in 1974.

Dates for the 1974 fair will be Oct. 4 and 5, the week after the International Plowing Match, scheduled for the Georgetown area.

Last Saturday, a group of directors attended the district annual meeting of fall fairs held in Collingwood. They reported a successful day, with more than 200 persons attending.

Plans were made for the annual directors' dinner next month, and a committee will include the president, Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Wilson and Mr. and Mrs. R. S. McMaster.

Notice of Public Hearing

In accordance with the Commission's Policy Statement on Cable Television dated July 16, 1971, cable television licensees are required to give priority to the carriage of certain Canadian television stations. The carriage of additional stations is optional and individual cable television licensees are expected to determine which optional stations best suit the needs of their subscribers and to request the Commission's authorization for their carriage.

The new Global Communications Network is scheduled to commence broadcasting in January, 1974. All cable television systems within the Grade B contours of any of the Global signals or for which reception of any of these signals is technically feasible and economically practical are expected to provide carriage immediately upon commencement of broadcasting.

In Its Public Announcement of July 27, 1972, the Commission indicated that a Canadian station which cannot be carried on its assigned channel because of technical reasons, should be converted to a standard channel which is uniform throughout the area of coverage. It is felt that such uniformity is in the best interest of the public and the television broadcasters. The Commission is of the opinion that it would be advantageous if the Global were carried on the same cable system channel where practical.

In addition, CBLFT, Channel 25, Toronto, has been broadcasting since March 23, 1972 and should be carried by all cable television systems within its Grade B contour or for which the reception of its signal is technically feasible and economically practical.

A number of licensees have already been approved for the carriage of CBLFT — in some cases on an interim basis where carriage was to be on the same channel as the local television station.

Accordingly, the Commission will hold a Public Hearing commencing Monday, November 26, 1973, at the Westbury Hotel, in Toronto, Ont., to consider the following applications for the carriage of Global and CBLFT. These applications also include other changes.

A NEW GOVERNMENT OF CANADA PROGRAM TO ASSIST FAMILIES TO PURCHASE A HOME OF THEIR CHOICE WITHIN THEIR MEANS.

WHAT IS THE PROGRAM? It's called the "Assisted Home-Ownership Program". The idea is to help lower-income families with one or more dependent children to own a home without spending more than 25% of their gross income.

HOW DOES IT WORK? Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation will provide a loan at below-market interest rate. CMHC will adjust its interest rate in accordance with your income. And in addition, CMHC will make an annual contribution of up to \$300 to assist you in meeting monthly payments of principal, interest and municipal taxes.

The assistance will be given through your family's mortgage account with CMHC, the monthly payment being reduced by the amount of the assistance.

The CMHC loan is 95% of lending value and requires a minimum down payment of 5% of lending value. The down payment

may be in the form of cash, land, labor, provincial grant or any combination of these. Loans will be for a five-year renewable term amortized over 35 years.

HOW DO I QUALIFY? If your family includes one or more dependent children and your annual income is within the qualifying range for the particular market area in which you live, you are eligible.

WHAT KIND OF HOUSING? Though not limited to a specific bedroom count, the housing contemplated will be modest in size and specifications. It may be new or existing housing.
