The banks and sides of No. 7 Highway at the east end of the village where the road has been straightened and a new bridge built, have been sodded and look tidy and clean. The new cement sidewalk on the south side of the highway which runs from the main corner to the Peel County border near Ron Moffatt's is a great improvement for those living at that end of the village. Children can now walk to school on the sidewalk instead of the highway but they still have to cross the busy highway to reach the school. With the elimination of the curves in the road the appearance of the village is now completely changed, however, Norval residents are beginning to get used to the 'new look' of the village.
