Raiders Flash On Home Ice

Georgetown Raiders saw action three times in the last six days, but managed only one win.

On Friday, the Raiders hosted the Fort Erie Merchants on home ice and took the game 5-2. Earlier in the week, in Fort Erie, the home town club went down to defeat, 6-5.

On Sunday, the Raiders travelled to Oakville, and dropped a close contest by two goals, 6-4.

Friday, the Raiders took advantage of their opportunity to nip Fort Erie, although they didn't quite start off in that direction. First goal of the game came at the 6:28 mark of the opening period when Oakville's John McReynolds scored, assisted by Ted Miskolcz and John Engles. The goal came with Junior Tibbetts and John Davidson in the penalty box.

But just about two minutes later, the Raiders were back in the match when Jim Blair snatched the rubber at the Fort Erie blue line and carried it into the net for an unassisted tally. Blair took dead aim at the Oakville goalie. He missed the stop and the puck was zippered right into the net.

The Raiders took the lead at 15:47 when Rutley won a faceoff to the left of the goal and passed to Davidson, who let go a blistering drive that bounced off the goal post and went into the net.

With a lead at the end of the first period, the Raiders had the steam to carry on through the second frame. Jeff Nicholson carried the puck the length of the ice, and dropped a pass to Doug Selby. Selby passed to Davidson who scored with another slap shot.

The period saw solid, aggressive hockey, but no other scoring.

In the third stanza, the Raiders continued their monopoly of the play.

The first goal was Paul Robinson's patented deflect shot into the net, after a pass from Tom Gilbert. Robinson was last year's leading scorer and he used his deflect shot for half of them.

At 8:50, Prosser scored, assisted by Rutley and Robinson. Finally at 13:14 Ken Kay of Fort Erie finished the scoring, but with the Raiders taking the match 5 to 2.

The Raiders outshot Fort Erie 42 to 28.

SUNDAY GAME
Sunday, after their victory on Friday, the Raiders travelled to Oakville, to lose 6-4.

Action began in period one with Oakville scoring three times. Scorers were Bob Laird, Charlie Byron and Ray Chism. Oakville outshot Georgetown 23 to 11 in the first period alone.

The second period, the Raiders played even worse than in period one. Oakville got two goals in the second period, by Chism and McCloud. The third period started out just as bad, with Chism's hat trick scoring against the Raiders at 1:26.

Finally the Raiders scored at 3:58 with Junior Tibbetts assisted by Tom Gilbert. At 13:10 Davidson scored with his slapshot from a point, assisted by Rutley. At 15:31 Gilbert scored assisted by Davidson. Only 10 seconds later Robinson scored assisted by Davidson and Tibbetts.

The last four minutes were see-saw hockey between Georgetown and Oakville. Even

though the Raiders outshot Oakville in the last period, Oakville got more shots over-all, 60 to 46.

This loss put Georgetown in a tie with Oakville for third place. Playing was definitely affected by excellent goalkeeping by Oakville and the loss of two solid Raider players because of

injuries. Dave McMenemy and John Boyce are out until Christmas with a torn ligament and broken elbow respectively.

On November 14, all Georgetown hockey fans should go to the arena to see an exhibition game between the Raiders and the Orillia Terriers, the top team in the Senior A League.

Playing their only game of the week, on Tuesday, Oct. 30, the Georgetown Minor Atoms emerged 3-2 victors after a hard fought game in a return match with Chinguacousy who had tied the local boys in a previous match.

The first period was scoreless though the home squad missed several golden opportunities to light up the scoreboard. In the second period Chinguacousy lit up the board first at 4:19. Then Bobby Morrow combined with Gordie Adams at 7:15 to knot the count at one all.

Early in the third period Mike Doucette put Georgetown ahead with assists going to Kevin Frank and Bobby Morrow. It appeared that the score would stand up but a slight defensive lapse at the 12 minute mark and Chinguacousy tied it up. A minute and seventeen seconds later Georgetown put the pressure on and a loose puck was picked up by Gordie Adams who banged it home for what proved to be the winning counter. Although Chinguacousy tried hard, Georgetown would not be denied this win, checking very

closely and held on to the final bell.

Terry Lane's minor atoms next game will be November 20, when they will be hosts to Streetsville at the Georgetown Arena. Game time is 6:45.
