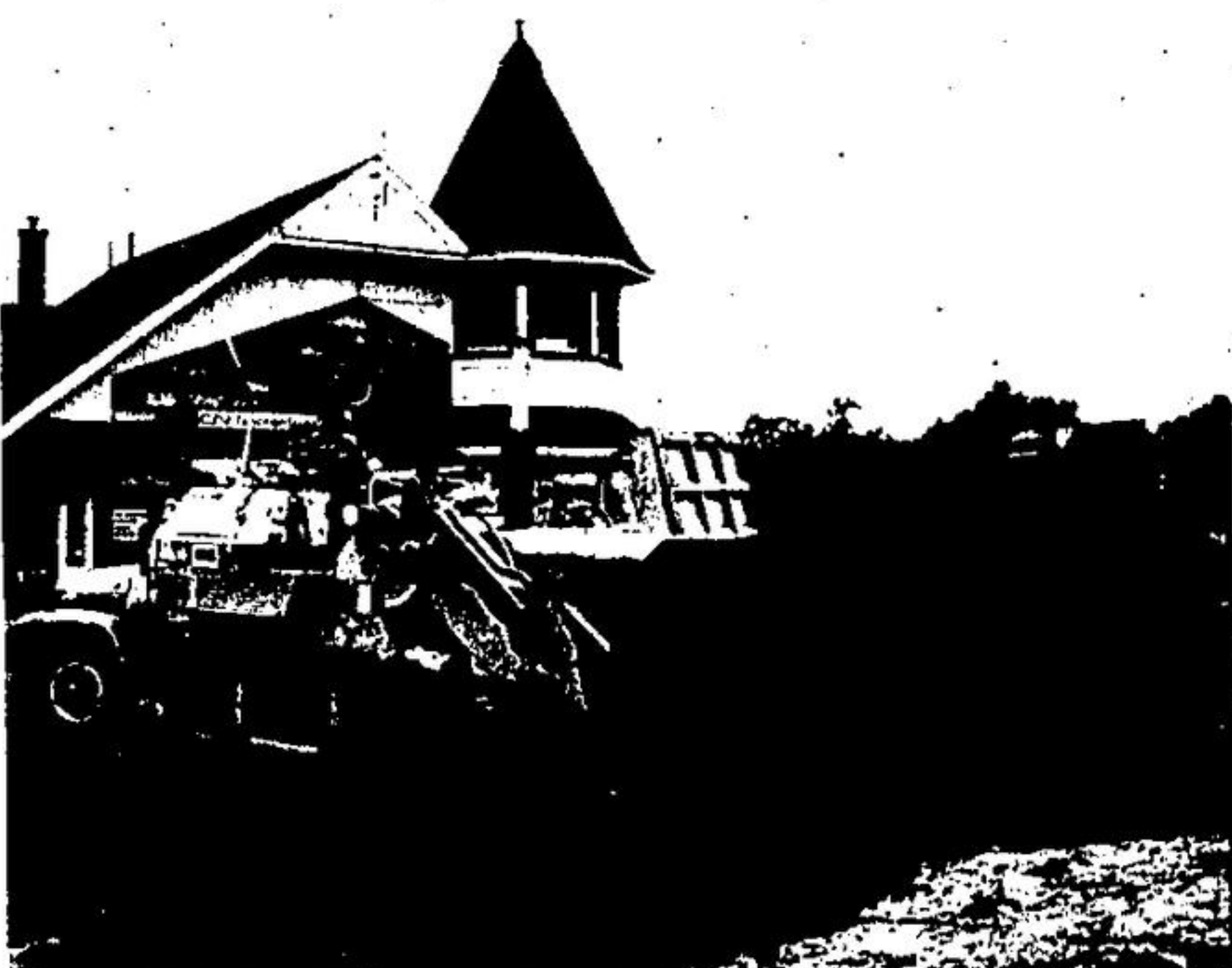

HALLOWEEN

"It was generally a quiet night," Police Chief Schwartz said, speaking about Halloween. "The weather was certainly a factor."
"Several flashing amber lights were knocked over on Guelph St. on Halloween which could have caused a serious accident," Chief Schwartz said. Shortly after Halloween was officially over, a man was arrested and charged with robbery with violence following an incident in a car on Guelph Street in the end. According to Chief Schwartz, a man was assaulted and his watch taken. Two police officers on patrol arrived on the scene during the incident and a man was arrested. Georgetown Fire Department answered a fire call on Halloween which turned out to be a smoke bomb prank. The police department is also investigating an alleged doctored treat incident on Halloween night.
In other news, police report two youths were charged with theft over \$200 following an incident involving the theft of a car owned by Terrence Roddick of Glen Williams. The Roddick vehicle was reported stolen from 100 Prince Charles Dr. Sunday evening and was recovered shortly after.
An attempted break in at the credit office of the Abitibi Paper Mill was reported to Georgetown police early Sunday morning. The inner doors of the office were tampered with, but Chief Schwartz said the would-be burglars were likely scared off by the plant's security personnel.
Police also report two automobile mishaps with damage exceeding \$50 in the past week.
A two-car mishap on Wednesday morning resulted in \$300 damage to a car operated by Danny L. Frey, 141 Emma St., Guelph, and \$300 damage to a vehicle driven by Jennifer M. Cooper of 28 Jocelyn Cres., Georgetown. The accident occurred at the intersection of Guelph St. and Durham St.
A car operated by Derek Reid of 20 Chipper Court, Georgetown sustained \$400 damage when it was in collision with a vehicle driven by Peter Joseph Smarda of 195 Delrex Blvd. The Smarda auto received \$250 damage in the mishap which occurred Sunday afternoon on Mountainview Rd. near Campbell Gate.
