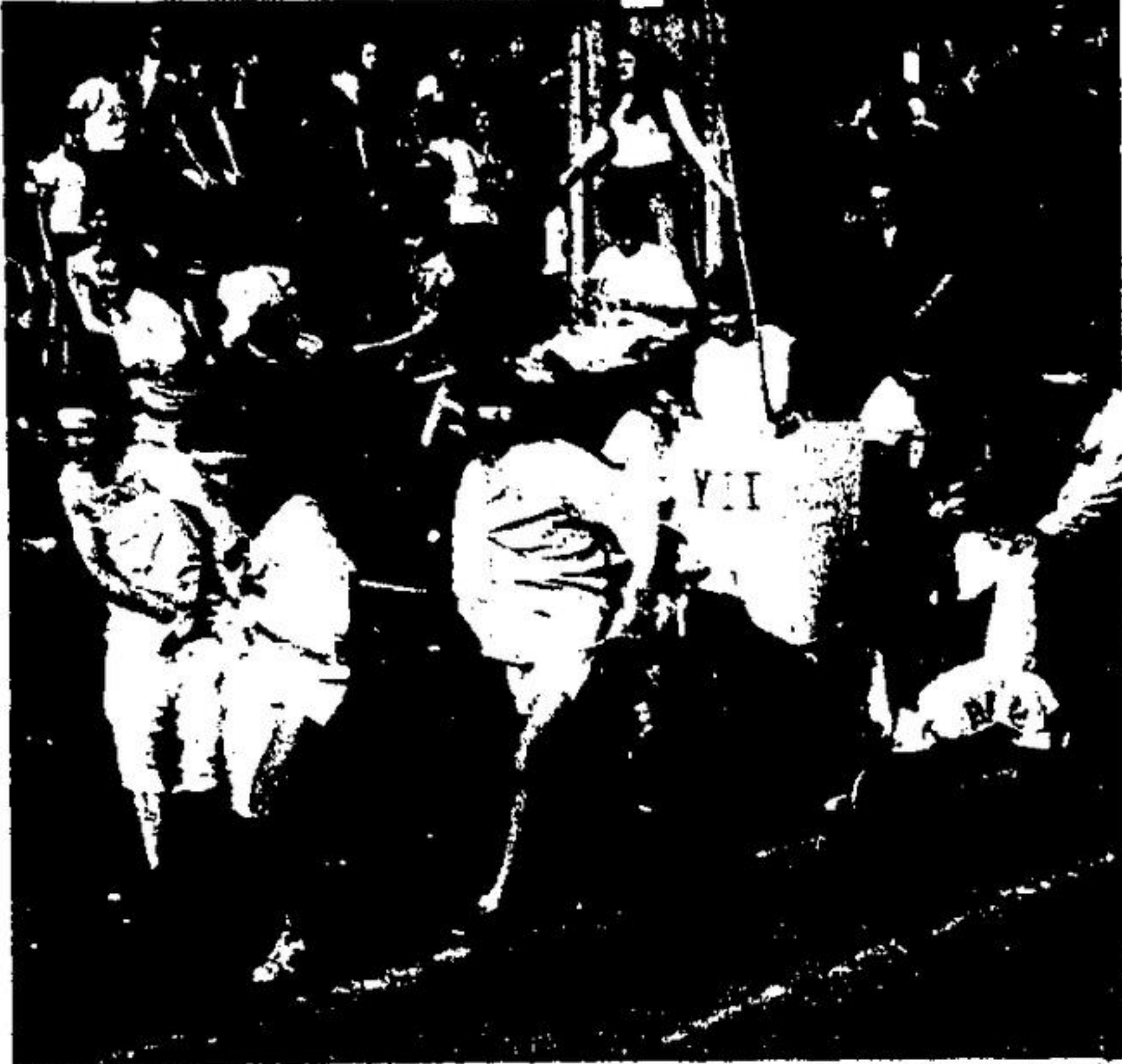


CHARIOTHON WRAP-UP

756 Squadron Air Cadets See Ottawa

On the morning of Friday, Oct. 12, 35 air cadets plus four officers left Georgetown for a weekend tour of Ottawa.

We arrived at CFB Ottawa following a five hour drive. Following a quick tour of the base, we were able to arrange usage of the base recreational facilities for the night.

We made up the beds, then proceeded to the mess for a filling meal. We marched back to the barracks, changed into civies, and went to the recreation centre for a rousing match of European handball, followed by a volleyball game.

Lights out came early and 35 air cadets hit the sack.

Reveille was six hundred hours, Saturday morning. We made up our beds, marched over to the mess for a breakfast of bacon and eggs.

We loaded the bus and travelled to the National Air Museum. Here we saw early aircraft such as Bell's Silver Dart and modern craft such as the CF-104 Starfighter. Most of these aircraft are in flyable condition.

We hopped on the bus and took a tour around the residences of the Governor General, Prime Minister, and the Leader of the Opposition, finally arriving at the National War Museum.

Canada's military history from the first wars of the French to the two world wars to the present day are displayed here.

There is also an excellent collection of medals of the Canadian, British, U.S., and German Armed Forces.

We went back to the base for lunch, then off to the Parliament Buildings for a tour of the Peace Tower, the House of Commons, the Senate and the library.

We then proceeded to the National Museum of Science and Technology. We saw the large display of rolling stock in Canada, farm machinery, communication equipment, old cars, and a rare nose section from an Avro Arrow.

We returned to CFB Ottawa for supper, sports and a little shut-eye.

Sunday morning came fast; we packed our bags, cleaned the barracks, went to mess, and in no time at all, we were home.

Appoint Magnuson To Regional Body

Glenn V. Magnuson, a Georgetown insurance agent and a member of the Georgetown Police Commission for the past two years, has been appointed to the Halton Regional Police Commission. Mr. Magnuson's appointment was announced Wednesday, Oct. 31.

In addition to the Georgetown appointee, the solicitor general also appointed Judge K. Warrender of Hamilton, and William Hourigan of Burlington to the five-man regional board.

The other two members of the commission are regional councillors George Harrington of Burlington and Harry Barrett of Oakville, both appointed to the commission by the Halton Regional Council last week. The board will select its own chairman.

Asked if the appointment came as a surprise, commissioner Magnuson said, "I was aware that I was being considered for the post. The solicitor general phoned me and advised me of the appointment shortly before the official announcement was made on Oct. 31."

"Our first concern is to create the Halton Region Police Department for Jan. 1," he said. "To continue to provide effective policing to the Halton region is obviously our central concern."

Commissioner Magnuson said that he has no specific plans for the commission. "It's so early, the commission hasn't met, so nothing has been decided." He did say that a central police headquarters would be set up somewhere in the region. "You just can't operate without it," he noted.

"I don't think the regional commission will change the character of the policing in any of the areas," he said. "There has been a working committee in effect for some months, reviewing what will be necessary for effective policing. The committee has been looking at various other regions and seeing how their police forces operate."

"I think it will be a challenging position, and we have our work cut out for us. I am confident, however, we can provide Halton with a very effective police force."

FIRST MEETING

The first meeting of the Halton Regional Police Commission is slated to take place late this week or early next week and will likely deal with the appointment of a chairman and the setting up of dates and times for meetings, Commissioner Magnuson said.

Financing services for the Halton Region become the responsibility of the Board of Commissioners of Police on January 1, 1974. The Halton Municipality of Halton consists of Burlington, Georgetown, Oakville and Milton.

"The amalgamation of municipal police forces into regional forces and the appointment of Regional Boards of Commissioners of Police reflect the government's objective to improve the quality of policing services in all parts of the province," Mr. Yaremko said.

"Larger regional police forces provide increased flexibility; better utilization of available police resources; centralized record storage; better communications between forces; and greater standardization in the application of the law."

Regional boards of commissioners of police now exist in the regional municipalities of York, Niagara, Sudbury and Waterloo and new boards are being established in the regional municipalities of Hamilton-Wentworth, Durham and Peel.
