

Present Halton Deanery Divided into Two Parts

The 98th Synod of the Diocese of Niagara took place at Hillfield-Strathallan School in Hamilton, Nov. 9 and 10. It was attended by lay and clerical delegates from the Anglican churches in this area - Halton county is the easternmost part of the Diocese.

This was the first synod presided over by John Bothwell as diocesan bishop, the "new boy", as he called himself. In his charge, he talked about the conservative and radical theological outlooks of some modern Christians, suggesting that a suitable Anglican

"middle way" would appreciate the values of the various schools of thought, without becoming entrenched in them.

He spoke, too, of the need for a more democratic style of leadership in the church, and of the changing role of the parish. Changes in the structure of the diocese were approved, including one that would divide in two the present Halton deanery, one to include the area of Oakville and Halton Hills, the other to include Burlington and Milton.

As part of this, the traditional title of rural dean was replaced by regional dean. In the debate on this question, one Milton delegate got in a dig at regional government. He said that for him "rural" suggested something natural, down-to-earth and grass-roots, while "regional" suggested something directed from the top downwards, remote and bureaucratic. After the laughter died down, the chancellor of the diocese (the Honorable Robert Welch, provincial Minister of Housing) quipped that Milton might be a long time in receiving adequate housing.

Members were encouraged to get their parishes working on a project to mark the approaching centennial of the diocese. And synod approved asking Lord Lyon for a grant of arms.

Talks from a missionary from Melanesia, and the bishop of Caledonia (in British Columbia) emphasized how the different parts of the church depend on one another. The bishop spoke of being reassured by the fact that people in the rich East have financial problems as much as the church in the North. And he described the Christian spirit of Indian congregations in the Haida and Nisga and other villages of his diocese.

But when someone suggested that the needs of the church in our own country ought to have a priority in our mission work, he emphasized that he didn't think the needs of the church in his diocese were more urgent than needs elsewhere. "If you can't", he said, "feel you ought to support all three: the needs of your own diocese, and of the church in the north of our own country, and of the church overseas, then maybe you ought to get out of the business."

Some of the delegates got lost in the business sessions, during the amendments to the amendments, but there were also discussion groups where people from different parishes could share and compare the problems and strengths of the church in their area.

Lay delegates from St. George's are Dr. Vicki DeKleer, Tom Parry and Grant Johnston; from St. Alban's is Vi Haines; from St. Paul's is Jim Draycott and from St. John's is Mrs. J. Ottawa.

Commencing Monday, November 26, 1973 at the Westbury Hotel in Toronto, Ontario the Canadian Radio-Television Commission is holding a Public Hearing to consider applications for the carriage of Global Communications and CBLFT Channel 25 Toronto as well as other channel changes. An application by Georgetown Cable TV Limited proposes the deletion of WNED-TV Buffalo, N.Y. Channel 17 to accommodate the carriage of Global Communications in addition to other channel changes. Letters have been received from a large number of our subscribers protesting the removal of WNED-TV and in most cases suggesting that WUTV, Buffalo, N. Y. Channel 29 be deleted instead. In order to present the Commission with our subscribers' views we are having a form completed by each subscriber who visits our office up to Friday, November 23rd.
