Hear Speaker About AOTS

New Controls End Hassles About Pits

Toronto Bureau of the Herald Toronto—Complaints against gravel pit noise, dust, and truck traffic have almost disappeared since the government introduced control legislation two years ago says Natural Resources Minister Leo Bernier.

Mr. Bernier told the Toronto Bureau of the Herald Tuesday complaints to his ministry have dropped 80 to 90 percent in the last two years. He said before 1971 there was no direction to the 75 companies operating in Ontario.

Mr. Bernier toured several operations on the Niagara Escarpment, Guelph, Cambridge area, and Paris

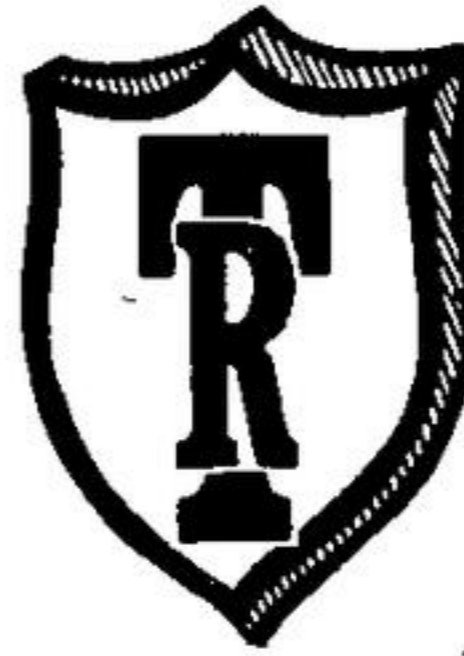
area. The visit was his first since the act was introduced to enforce rehabilitation of the pits.

At the Berfoyle property of TCG Materials Limited near Guelph, Mr. Bernier viewed the use of mounds of soil to hide the operation from highway traffic.

J. Crawford Reid, executive vice-president of the company showed Mr. Bernier a number of plans for the area which included park facilities, a lake, and 80 one acre lots for a residential development.

Mr. Reid said rehabilitation represented a five to 10 percent added operating cost.

The minister concentrated his trip west of Toronto as more than 50 gravel operations in the province are located on the escarpment from Orangeville to Niagara Falls.
