



### Stage Show For Sheridan

Sheridan College students are preparing for their annual college show production Oh What A Lovely War, scheduled for public viewing in early March.

The play is portrayed as a tragedy and satirical comedy on World War I, told through songs and documents of the period. A series of background slides and war headlines with up-to-date death counts' flashed on newspanels throughout, add authenticity and detail to the

The events are presented without bitterness or bias by a Sheridan College cast of 30. whose songs, surrealistic costumes and routines depict the "war game" sequence.

Oh What a Lovely War had its longest run (11 years) at Theatre Royal, Stratford. England, presented by the Theatre Workshop under the direction of Joan Littlewood. It went on to win the acclaim of French audiences in Paris

"It's truly one of the best written plays I've seen," said Sheridan director, Rod Maxwell, who directed last year's musical smash hit Charlie Brown.

This is the first year that staff and students have been invited to join the cast and according to ! rehearsal attendance, the play has the support of the total college.

The cast is drawn from the School of Nursing in Mississouga, Brampton and Oakville Campuses.

Unlike most plays, there isn't a main lead character in Oh What a Lovely War. In lact. some members of the cast will perform as many as five different roles which allows everyone equal opportunity for participation.
