IN HALTON HILLS

Snowfall Causes Chaos For Highway 401 Traffic

An hour of light snowfall that fell across Halton county Friday afternoon caused chaos along Highway 401.

Milton OPP reported that during one hour from 1.30 to 2.30 p.m., 15 mishaps took place along the highway in the 18-mile stretch from the Wellington Halton county line on the west and the boundary of Peel County on the east.

A police spokesman estimated an average of \$500 damages as a result of each mishap. There were no injuries.

Only two charges were laid by police following the incidents on Highway 401. Charged with impaired driving were George Edward Page, 53, of London and Wayne McMahon, 22, of Weston.

The two men were involved in separate accidents, the two most serious of the day. In both cases their cars, one a 1973 model, the other a 1974 model, were demolished. Police

estimated damages at \$3,900 and \$4,000.

When the vehicle driven by Mr. Page spun out of control off the highway it destroyed four guardposts as well.

As well, police laid charges in the north end of the county following a collision on Highway 7 at Churchhill Road on the west side of Acton. Charged

with careless driving was Joseph Aucoin, 27, of Weston Ontario.

His vehicle, a late model van, received \$800 damage when it was in collision with a car driven by Daniel McTavish, 17, of Linnichouse.

The McTavish vehicle sustained \$2,000 damage. There were no injuries.

MBE Award For Sister

Control Construction In Flood Plain Areas

Credit Valley Conservation Authority has recently added new areas to its regulations regarding placement of fill, construction and alterations to waterways in the Credit River Watershed.

Regulations now in force include the Credit River Valley from Lake Ontario to the Orangeville Reservoir. Tributary streams in the Town of Orangeville, Silver Creek in the Georgetown area, Fletchers Creek in Brampton and Cooksville Creek and other smaller creeks in Mississauga are also included under these regulations.

The regulation controls construction on flood plain areas, the dumping or placement of fill in the flood plain and interference in any

way with streams, creeks, rivers and watercourses within the jurisdiction of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. According to the regulations, anyone contemplating building, placing fill in a flood plain area or altering a watercourse must apply to the Authority for permission. When an application is received, maps with regional storm flood lines are consulted. Each application is considered individually on its own merit considering the circumstances which affect the site.

Copies of this revised regulation (211-73) have been distributed to local municipalities, solicitors, real estate firms and construction companies in the general watershed area.
