

O.P.P. REPORT

During the week ending Nov. 17, police officers from Milton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police investigated 73 general occurrences, included in this number were: three break and enters, two thefts, three alleged thefts, five persons were charged for violating the Liquor Control Act, one domestic complaint,

one threatening phone call, one person was charged for violating the narcotic control act, six charges were laid relating to impaired driving, one stolen car was recovered and one person was charged for driving while his driver's licence was under suspension, three trespass complaints.

The remaining occurrences were relatively minor in nature and required little time to clear.

This same reporting period saw officers investigate 13 motor vehicle collisions involving 19 vehicles; 12 persons were injured in seven of the collisions and property damage was estimated to exceed \$11,750.00. Thirteen charges for violation of the Highway Traffic Act have been laid as a result of 10 of these collisions. The cause of the remaining three were attributed to road conditions.

During the week Provincial Constable J.H.L. Redpath, Safety and Information officer of Milton detachment, spoke to students at Robert Little Public School in Acton and Georgetown District Christian School about safety.
