

## Raiders Nip Oakville In Overtime

Doug Tate powered the Raiders to a 5-4 win in overtime hockey action at the Georgetown arena, Friday, when he scored the winning goal in overtime to help his club down the Adanacs from Oakville.

The match was a seesaw battle that offered fast action, plenty of bodychecks and some of the best hockey that the Raiders have displayed this season. The Raiders had the edge going into the dying minutes of the third period, but 23 seconds from the end of the game, Bob Williams snared a pass from Dave Beatty and Charlie Burton and dumped the rubber behind netminder Bruce Jackson. That notched the score at four goals for each side, and set the stage for 10 minutes of sudden-death overtime.

As it turned out, 10 minutes were not needed. Oakville helped bring about its own downfall when Bob Laird got a penalty for tripping during a Raider rush. His sin came at the two-minute mark. Thirty seconds later, Tate connected for the goal.

The Raiders went into the game just two days after a hometown exhibition match with the Orillia Terriers, which they lost. Friday's regular contest got off to a dismal start, when the Adanacs scored at the 2:11 mark of the first frame. Burton got that goal, assisted by Ray Chisholme. It took the Raiders three minutes to get back into the game, with Jim Prosser scoring at the 5:18 mark. Bill Currie gave him the assist.

The Adanacs picked up the third goal of the game, to hold the lead for four minutes. Dave Beatty scored for Oakville, assisted by Laird, at 8:40, with Tom Gilbert returning the fire for the Raiders at 12:54. Gilbert got assists from Junior Tibbetts and Currie.

Ray Evans gave the Raiders the period lead when he scored from Prosser and Jeff Nicholson at 18:30. Second-period scoring was limited to the Adanacs, with Beatty putting one into the net.

unassisted, near the end of the frame.

Both teams played battle-ground hockey for much of the final stanza. Scoring came in the final minutes, the Raiders going ahead on a crowd-pleasing score by Tibbetts at the 17:27 mark. Then Oakville tied things up.

Beatty's first-period goal for Oakville came after he took a hard slapshot, that bounced off the boards behind Jackson. Beatty came in on the rebound and flicked it into the net, a nice bit of basketball, hockey—Ross Busselle suffered a banged knee for Oakville in the first period and had to be helped by teammates from the ice. He missed the remainder of the period but returned to his defence duties in the second period.

Adanac goalie Mario MacDonald felled Tom Gilbert on one shot in the opening period, but Gilbert kept up the nooding pressure and finally worked one past the little netminder. MacDonald also had some problems with a cut above one eye, which sent some blood into his face mask.

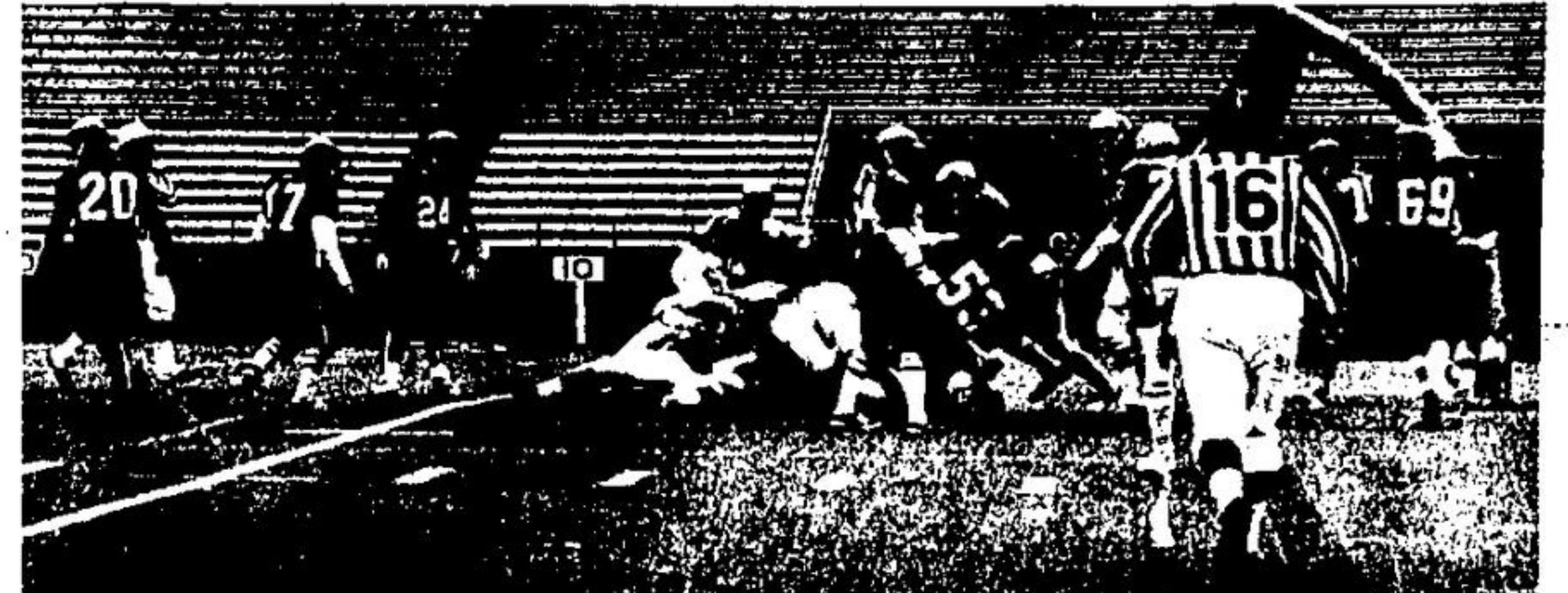
Doug Savin carried the Oak-

ville attack in behind the Raider defence on one play in the third, only to have Jackson make a nice save. And earlier in the game, Jackson came up with a bellyflop to the ice that turned back another Oakville shot. Don Norton had a break for the Raiders in the third, only to see his shot miss the Oakville net.

Second period of the game got off to a confused start, when officials assessed a roughing penalty against Chisholme of Oakville, and then found the wrong player had been called.

Doug Savin was sent into the sin bin instead. Only one major penalty was assessed in the game, and it was a 10 minute call against Rick Whincell of Oakville.

## BURLINGTON WIN

### Rebels Drop Championship Game

It was a case of the breaks going the wrong way as the Georgetown Rebels football team lost 30-0 to Burlington Central Tigers in the Halton County championship game played at Ivor Wynn stadium in Hamilton Friday.

Burlington seniors put together two long pass plays and a fumble recovery for three touchdowns with added points coming from two field goals, a safety, and a single point.

"Three plays killed us," said Rebel head coach Frank Kotani. "If it hadn't been for those two long passes and a fumble, the game would have been totally different. They were never able to put together a long drive against us, just two long passes and a recovered fumble," he said.

The scoring opened on a 45 yard pass which saw Georgetown safety Gerald Williams slip in a pool of water, allowing Burlington its first score.

"That play was one of the breaks," said coach Kotani. "Williams is one of our best defenders and he slipped in one of the few pools of water on the field."

Another long pass gave Burlington its second touchdown in the second quarter.

**LONG PLAYS**  
 "Their quarterback has been

playing for something like seven years," Kotani said. "Ken Sovran, our quarterback, has played only ten games. Both quarterbacks are good, but Boivare had the experience."

Burlington's third score came on a recovered Georgetown fumble which saw Burlington co-captain John Kalbfleisch ramble for the score.

All three touchdowns were converted by Burlington kicker Jeff Blackwell.

Blackwell was also good on two field goals in the last half. Georgetown showed great promise as it put together a first-quarter drive from its own 35-yard line which took the teams down to Burlington's 20-yard line. A Georgetown fumble ended that drive.

The deepest penetration by the Rebels was to the Trojan three-yard line. They gambled on third down but were repulsed by the Trojan front line.

"The field was pretty good," said coach Kotani. "If we had played in any other field than Ivor Wynn, it would have been a mud bowl."

**INTO FINALS**  
 "We're very proud to have made it to the finals this year," he said. "We'll be there next year, too."

The Rebels will lose only six players for next year's season. From a team composed largely of grade 11 and grade 12 players, only Ken Sovran, Ted Darcie, Werner Mikolet, Richard De Groat, Rob Lister and John Sargent will not be returning.

This year's senior team was composed of Bill Bradley, Ken Sovran, Ted Darcie, Steve Foster, Gary Dewhurst, Blake Shorthill, Wherner Mikolet, Tony Pacheco, Gord McWilly, Gerald Williams, Phil Noble, Howard Gaskin, Larry Cook, Wayne Guardhouse, Dave Bagby, Andy Camman, Sam Caruso, Joe Daignault, Richard De Groat, Peter Hurler, Rob Lister, Gary Miller, Chris Milne, Mike Pierce, John Sargent, Chris Somerville, and John Pengergast.

Head coach Frank Kotani was assisted by offensive coach A. Finlayson and defensive coach G. Hill.

Several hundred fans from Halton county schools were on hand to watch the championship game, including a large contingent from Georgetown.
