**DEBRIS USED** 

Don't burn your garden debris-compost it. That's good advice from Burke McNeill. horticultural specialist with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

To make a compost pile, gather all the vegetative material from garden cleanups, including pea vines, corn stalks, and leaves. Pile these materials in a convenient spot in six-to eight-inch-deep layers. Between each layer spread an activator to aid the decom-

position process. Barnyard manure or a fertilizer, such as 33 per cent immonium nitrate, make excellent activators. There are also commercially prepared products available.

Once the pile is complete, top should have some of the finest it off with a six-inch soil layer, garden humus you can obtain Make a shallow depression in anywhere. And you're the top of the soil layer to catch recycling waste that would otherwise be burned or thrown and hold moisture. After about six months, you out.
