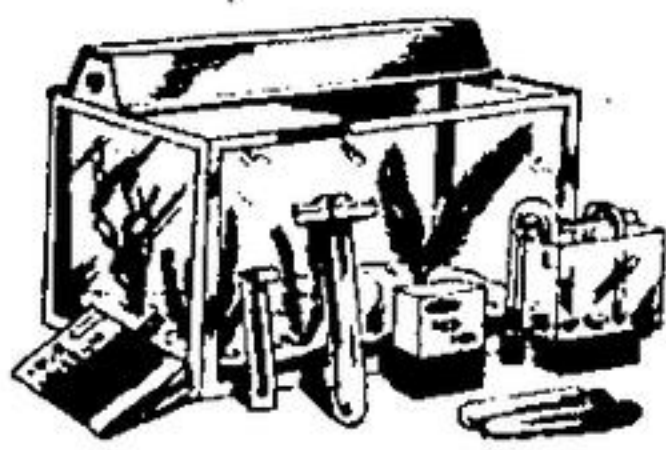

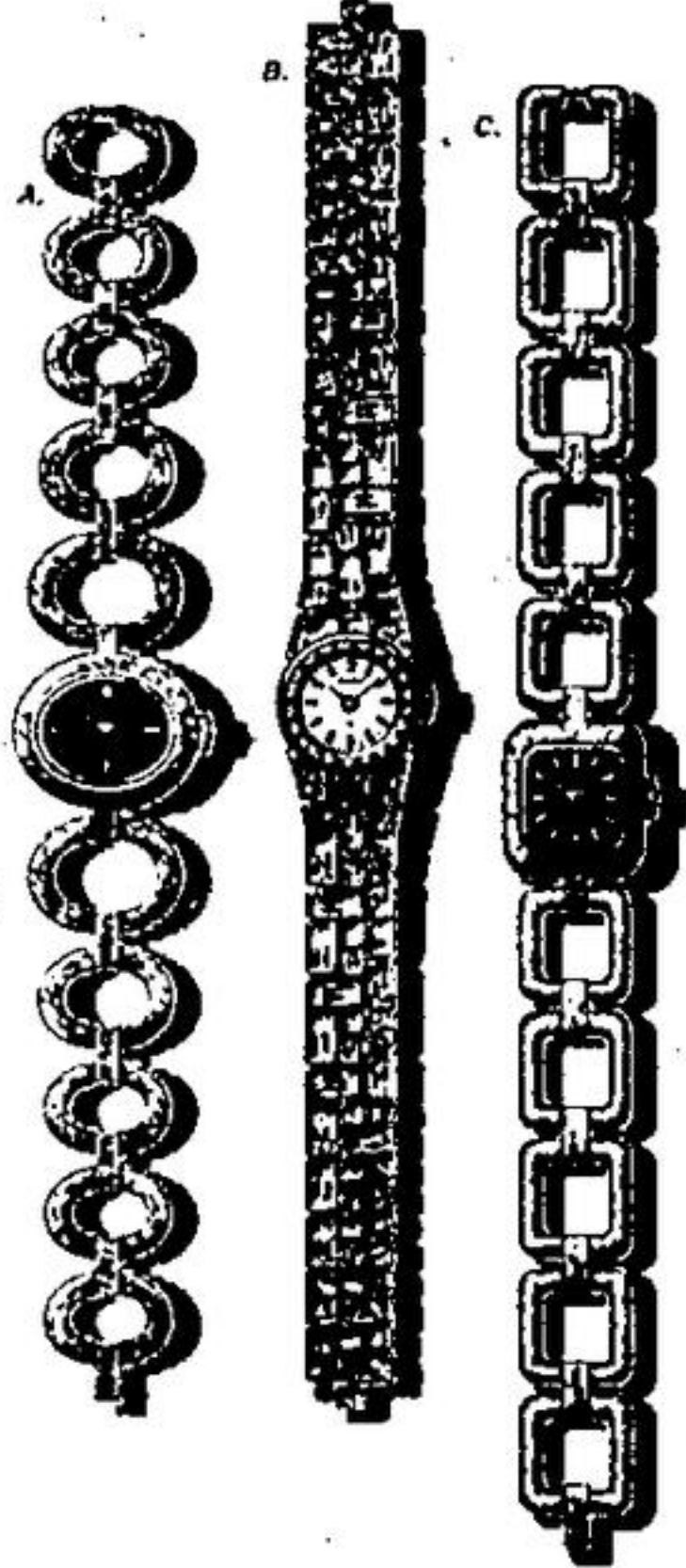

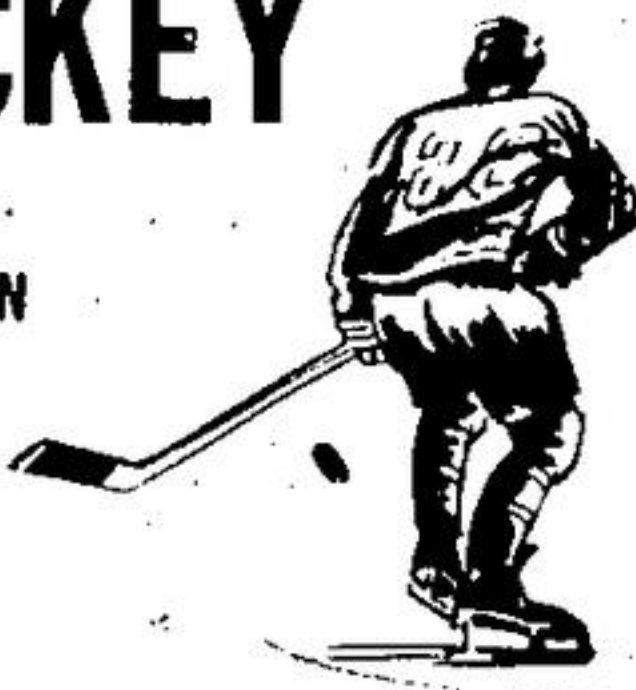

Raiders Hook Victory Over Mudcats, 6 - 1

Dunnville Mudcats came to Georgetown, Friday, and ran smack into a revitalized intermediate hockey club, the Raiders. The home team disposed of the visitors 6-1.

Much of the credit for the improved Georgetown team is due to the presence of a new defenceman, Rick McLochlin. He was on duty at the blue line for Friday's game and he added some solid positional hockey to his team.

McLochlin, who has had hockey experience with the Barrie Flyers, and who now sells real estate in that community (he's commuting for the Raiders) scored what proved to be the winning goal. He notched that tally, the second for the Raiders in the first period, near the end of the frame.

From that point in time (to quote Watergate) the home squad never looked back.

Also back with the Raiders for the game, fresh from holidays, was forward John Moro. He made his presence felt with an assist on the fifth Raider goal.

Moro had a fine breakaway rush on the Mudcat goal in the second period, when he got behind the visitor's defence, but his shot was stopped by net-minder Pete Jenkins. Shortly after, Doug Tate had a good scoring opportunity, only to be thwarted again by Jenkins.

That just about spelled the end for fifty Mudcat netminding, as the Raiders honed their sticks, readjusted their sights, and began popping rubber into the net as fast as a champion olive stuffer stuffs olives on the slopes of Vesuvius.

As has been their wont, lately, the Raiders potted the visitors a one-goal lead as the game got under way. Mudcats scored on a rush led by Ken Austin at the 5:56 mark. Just more than 10 minutes later, the Raiders got the range and tied the game. They got another marker to take the lead, then built up the insurance premiums.

SLAPSHOTS - Bruce Jackson turned in some fine goaltending for the Raiders, as he handled 42 shots during the game (the Raiders in turn fired 45 shots at the Mudcats). He made a brilliant save on a breakaway by Mudcat Bill Adlam and even caught a puck that had slipped behind him and was creeping towards the goal line. Fellow netminder Tom Bowker had to leave the game at the 19:59

mark of the first period when he was whacked on the head by an errant stick. It caused him to bump his head, in turn, on the goal post. Pete Jenkins came in as replacement.

There were six periods of hockey played, two because of accidental soundings of the siren and one because the first period ended one second short of the mark after Bowker's injury. That one second was made up at the start of the second period. If you're wondering why the Mudcats are called mudcats, it's because mudcats, a fish, are common game in the Dunnville vicinity. Mudcat games on home ice usually see a mudcat or two (the fish, not the player) tossed onto the ice.

Mudcats had eight men on the ice for three seconds in the first period, during a line change, but they missed the eyes of the officials and weren't called. Rick Thompson won the lucky program draw, but missed out on the \$10 prize when the man of his choice, Junior Tibbets, couldn't score a penalty shot on Jackson.

Final Georgetown goal was a good effort by Don Norton, who came rushing in from the blue line to park the puck cleanly in the Mudcat net. Fans were out in large numbers for game, and they can turn out in ever larger numbers for some more good hockey Friday, when the Raiders host Fort Erie.
