

GLEN WILLIAMS

He commented on its present policy for recycling its own waste, and the company's involvement in the processing of post-consumer waste.

A hopeful note for residents around Domtar locality is the probable end of animal protein as the coating adhesive.

This protein is the main cause of the odor from the settling ponds. The adverse weather greatly affects the conditions under which the bacteria grows, causing the smell.

Under certain conditions, this bacteria can lay dormant.
