

Raiders Storm Fort Erie 10-5

Man Charged

The Georgetown Raiders more than made up for a lacklustre first period by downing Fort Erie by a 10-5 score in Georgetown Friday night. There was no scoring in the

first period which was remarkable only for the poor quality of hockey played. The second period was another story however. After falling behind 2-1, Georgetown roared back and scored seven goals in the space of eight minutes. Providing the spark for the Raiders was the combination of Junior Tibbetts and Tom Gilbert.

Big guns for the raiders were Doug Tate with a hat trick and one assist, and Junior Tibbetts with one goal and three assists. Bill Currie was a stand out on defence.

Georgetown Judo

A monthly judo column will be published in the Herald, written by the Georgetown Judo Club. This is the first of a monthly series.

The Georgetown Judo Club is not a commercial venture, but operated by a group of enthusiastic senior members associated with the Recreation Committee.

Instructor is W. Docherty, who has a third degree black belt. He is one of the foremost instructors in Canada and teaches a very high grade of judo.

For the uninitiated, judo is known as the gentle art of self-defense, a sport developed from the ancient warlike arts of Japan. In essence, it teaches one to use the impetus of an opponent to the advantage so that by adding force, one can overpower that opponent.

This doesn't come easily, as body building a constant practice of many skills are required. Strangely enough, most newcomers enjoy the hard work involved.

Activities at the club are not confined to the Georgetown area, as members regularly travel to tournaments throughout Ontario and the United States. Any member can enter these tournaments and fight as an individual.

On Sunday, Dec. 9 a tournament will be held at the club in the Rose Room. Expected are many out of town clubs. Male and female members ranging in age from six to 18, graded by weight, age, and rank will be competing.

The club trains on Tuesdays and Thursdays. On Saturdays an extra class is provided for juniors who have earned colored belts. Anyone is welcome to look in.

Recently, two members attended contest at the home club. W. Cowley and R. Parsons put up a credible performance and Rober Parsons was promoted from a yellow to an orange belt.

Authority Approves Project

Milton-The Halton region conservation authority approved a \$37,000 channelling project to be carried out on the Joshua Creek in Oakville.

Acton to Get Tennis Courts
