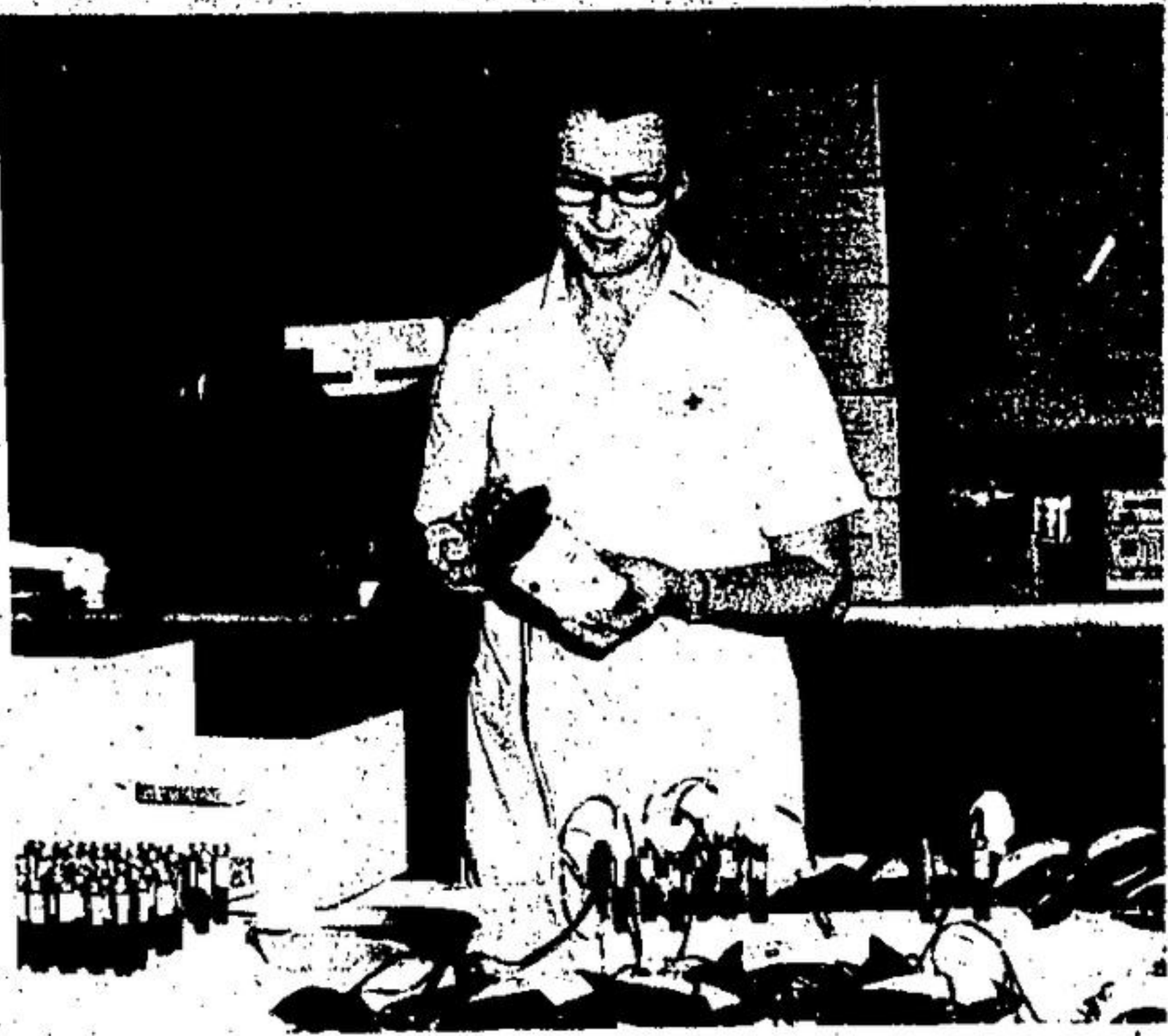


## Blood Donors and Barbershoppers at Holy Cross

**THE RED CROSS** blood donor clinic was at Holy Cross Church hall on December 10 with a total of 356 packs of blood being donated. There were 401 persons attending the clinic with 45 rejects, compared to last year's total of 389 persons, 375 donors, and 14 rejects. Most of the blood was donated in the evening as people patiently lined up and waited their turn. The travelling clinic is composed of nurses and Red Cross workers, all from Toronto, who selected and sorted blood types as well as stationing themselves beside donors for comfort and safety. ## Night School Classes To Begin January 16

The Adult Education department of the Halton Board of Education is registering 10-week night classes at Georgetown high school on Tuesday, January 8th, 1974. These classes are all ten weeks in length and instruction will begin on Wednesday, January 16th.

Several courses now concluding will run again - viz. Automobile Maintenance for Men and Women, Bookkeeping for a Small Business, Brush Up Your Typing Skills (for people whose typing has become rusty and who wish a refresher course), Office Procedures, (filling, setting up letters, duplicating procedures, general office routines, some typing) Guitar Playing for Beginners and Amateurs, Rug Hooking, Interior Design and Decorating the Home, Or-

amental Metalwork, (make your own project out of metal), Pottery, (one class only because of limited storage and facilities), Welding, Golf Instruction, (get in shape for spring season with your local golf pro) Woodworking for Men and Women (do your own project in wood with modern machinery and the help of an expert instructor).

Classes in the English language for new Canadians or anyone who wishes to improve his spoken English are held every Monday and Thursday. Students may enter this class at any time for a fee of five dollars.

Several classes are being offered for the first time. They include Budget Cooking (learn to cook economically but not at the loss of taste enjoyment) Chair Caning with Mrs. Seeds (take advantage of the opportunity to learn this seldom-offered craft), Cottage and Home Electrical Maintenance, (learn how to make electrical installations in your home recreation room, cottage etc.), Creative Painting, (work in the media of your choice) Furniture Refinishing, Restoration and Repair, Needlepoint (crocheting, crewel, petit point etc.), Snowmobile, Outboard Motor Maintenance, and Spring Gardening, (pruning, propagation, perennials, new varieties, care and installation of lawns) and Wine Making.

Flyers listing the course times, and nights will be sent home by the elementary students January 3rd and 4th. There will be a handout at local shopping malls, Saturday, January 5th and public will be kept informed by advertisements in local newspapers.

## Government Plans Four New Parks

TORONTO—The provincial government has plans for four new parks along the Niagara Escarpment and is considering several more, says John Featherstone, deputy regional director for Central Ontario.

The four parks are in various stages of planning for development in the next two to three years. Included are Short Hills, St. Catharines, Forks of the Credit, Brampton; Mono Rocks, Orangeville; and Primrose, Shelburne.

Master plans for the projects will go to Natural Resources Minister Leo Bernier early in 1974, when priorities will be set for development.

The ministry is concentrating on preparation of a master plan for Mono Rocks provincial park. Earlier this week the ministry received 20 public

briefs all supporting a low intensity use of the 1600 acre development. A draft master plan is expected in late January.

The escarpment parks are essentially planned for day use. The parks will provide facilities to the people within the Toronto Centred Region. Plan which involves an area between Hamilton and Oshawa and north to Barrie.

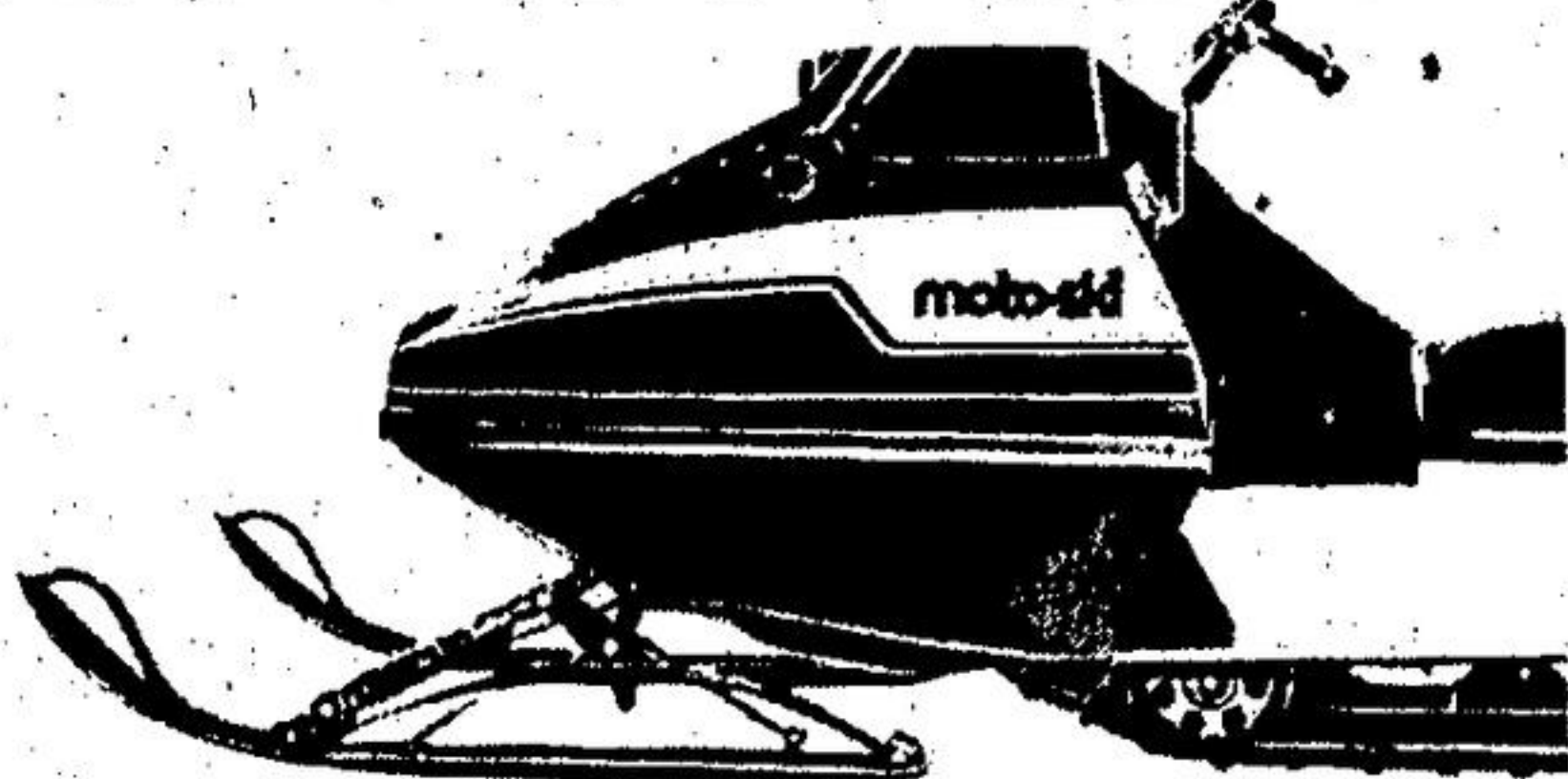
It will soon be Christmas Day again. Although 2000 years have passed since our Saviour's birth, the light that shone down where he lay still shines upon the earth.
