The game was tied 2-2 at 10:25 when Ron Wilson scored for the Merchants on a power-play goal assisted by Neil McIntyre and Ed Putman. Dundas went ahead at 12:20

when Joe Donald scored, again on a power-play while the Raiders were one man short. He was assisted by Fraser Rice.

Before the end of the first period, Georgetown managed to tie the score on a goal by Jim Blair at the 16:47 mark. Jim Prosser and Junior Tibbells helped him put the puck in for the tying goal.

The second period saw only one goal by Tommy Gilbert at the 9:36 mark to leave the Merchants ahead 4-3 at the close of the period. However, shortly after scoring his goal,

Gilbert became mixed up in a scuffle with Jim Cochrane. Both received seven minutes in the penalty box.

The third period saw Georgetown widen the lead they attained in the second. At 4:16 Doug Tate scored after carrying the puck from behind his own net down the length of the ice and putting it behind the Merchant's goalkeeper.

Junior Tibbells put the final touch to the game when he scored at the 14:47 mark on assists from Neil Cotton and Ray Evans. Although the score indicates

## AIRPORT INQUIRY COMMISSION COMMISSION D'ENQUÊTE SUR L'AÉROPORT

TAKE NOTICE that by Order in Council P.C. 1973-3026 dated 5th October, 1973, the Government of Canada established the Airport Inquiry Commission to inquire into and report upon the air transportation needs of the central Ontario market.

The Commission has opened its office at Suite 5401, 54th Floor of the Toronto Dominion Bank Tower, Toronto-Dominion Centre, in the City of Toronto. The manner in which the Commission will conduct this Inquiry may be briefly stated as follows:

1. The Government of Canada will file a summary of all relevant factors, with supporting documents, which the Government considered in reaching its decisions that the transportation needs of the central Ontario market require that there be established another International Airport in addition to the existing Toronto International Airport, Malton, and that the location of the new International Airport be at a site near Pickering, Ontario.
2. The Government of Canada documents so filed will be available for inspection by any member of the public at the office of the Commission.
3. All persons, including witnesses for the Government of Canada, who wish to appear before the Commission at any Public Hearing will be required to file at the Commission's office a full written statement of the evidence which they propose to adduce before the Com-

mission. Personnel will be available at the Commission's office to guide members of the public who wish assistance with the preparation of the written statement of their proposed evidence.

4. All written statements of evidence will be available for inspection at the Commission's office by any member of the public in advance of any Public Hearing at which such evidence will be introduced before the Commission.

5. The Commission has established a Practice and Procedure for the orderly conduct of the Inquiry. Copies are available at the Commission's office free of charge or will be mailed to any interested person upon request.

This Practice and Procedure has been framed with a view that all persons will have the opportunity before any Public Hearing to know the nature of the evidence that will be submitted to the Commission at each Public Hearing.

6. There will be a public Organizational Meeting before the Public Hearings commence relating to the manner of conducting such Public Hearings. Notice of the time and place of the Organizational Meeting will be given by notice published in newspapers serving the central Ontario market.

7. Public Hearings will take place from time to time and the date and place of each Hearing will be given to the public in advance by notices published in newspapers serving the central Ontario market.
