O'Connor Unsuccessful Getting Direct Answer

OTTAWA—Terry O'Connor failed to receive a direct answer Thursday in the House of Commons when he asked the federal minister of industry, trade and commerce if a date has been set for auto pact negotiations with the United States.

Alastair Gillespie replied: "We are prepared to meet with the United States authorities at any time."

Mr. O'Connor, Conservative MP for Halton, responded: "The answer is no, then." Previously, he said the negotiations "have been delayed from time to time over the past year."

The Conservative auto pact expert said that the value of automobile imports-excluding United States cars-was \$373 million higher in the first nine months of this year than in the comparable period in 1972.

He inquired if Mr. Gillespie will ask car companies to hold prices down so that North American cars can compete better with offshore imports. The minister replied that the volume of export fluctuates annually, and sometimes they will be in our favor and sometimes not.

He also said that Canadian auto companies are committed to see that any price increases for 1973 and 1974 models will narrow the price gap.
